A WEEK CALLED HOLY



We call this week in our liturgical calendar "Holy Week." I find myself reflecting on why we call it holy.

In the Jewish tradition at the beginning of the Passover Seder the youngest child asks the assembled family and friends around the Passover dinner table, 'Why is tonight different from every other night?" Thus begins the Passover dinner and the telling of

the ancient Hebrew story of the escape from Egypt and the journey to the Land of Promise.

In a very real way, the night of the Passover dinner is no different from any other night. And, in a very real way the night of the Passover celebration is significantly different since it is a special time set aside for the Jewish people to remember an important part of their foundational story as a people. The night is ordinary in that it is like any other night, and the night is special because the ritual of the Passover points to the unique relationship and formative event in the relationship between God and the Hebrew people.

I believe that Holy Week is like that. We set aside a special time of remembrance to recollect and experience once again the events of Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection. This week is no different than any other week. It is an ordinary week. The stores are open, people still go to work, the day to day busyness of our lives continues. It is a week like any other week. And, it is not like any other week. It becomes 'holy' because we set it aside to make special remembrances and liturgies to signify it as holy.

William Temple, a former Archbishop of Canterbury, once wrote, "The bread on the altar is holy, because all bread everywhere is holy. But the reason we know all bread everywhere is holy, is because we partake of the bread on the altar which is holy."

There is great insight in Archbishop Temple's statement. There is the recognition that holiness is to be found in the everyday and in the ordinary. Ordinary bread becomes for us the Bread of Life in the Eucharist. There is also the recognition that it is because we partake of the holiness of the Eucharist that we are able to see the divine at work in the world around us and therefore see the world as holy.

The same is true of Holy Week. We are invited into this ordinary week of work and school and shopping and at the same time are invited into the holiness of the liturgies that we celebrate. Our participation in this week we call Holy enables us to see the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus in the world around us in the everyday and ordinary of our lives.

Why is this week different from any other week? It's not. It is an ordinary week.

Why is this week different from any other week? Because, it is.

It is a special time that we set aside to recognize the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus and the passion, death, and resurrection in our own lives and in the world around us. It is a time when we take special note of the holiness in us and in our world. By setting aside this time and marking it as holy, it gives us insight into the holiness of our everyday.

I pray for you all a blessed Holy Week and glorious Easter.


Easter Brunch and Easter Egg Hunt


solidarity with their neighbors even though it becomes obvious that they will probably be killed.

A View from the Pew



We are over half way through Lent and, by now, many of us have made vows to "give something up" during the season. Usually it is something not particularly good for us, such as sweets, fatty foods, too much television, or way too much activity on our cell phones. All of this is well and good, if only because it will improve our lives. Ironically, however, it has

little or nothing to do with Lent.

Lent is about making a "sacrifice," not giving something up. To make a sacrifice means to offer up something very precious to you, something "sacred," in order to support or save something much greater than you. A classic example is a mother or father sacrificing day in and day out so their children may have good lives. Another classic example is a soldier sacrificing their life so their fellow soldiers will not die. In the Bible, Jesus' example was to sacrifice his temporal human life on Earth so we might have eternal spiritual life with God in Heaven.

In other words, while there is nothing wrong with giving something up, especially if it makes our lives better, such as a fasting to improve our prayer-lives with God, Lent is not about refraining from doing something for our own benefit. It is about deciding to do something for the benefit of others.

Archangel Gabriel or no Archangel Gabriel, think about the sacrifice of an older woman named Elizabeth who, during the many years of her long marriage to good man and Temple priest named Zechariah, was unable to have any children, but who miraculously becomes pregnant in her advanced age. Knowing the risks, she nevertheless decided to keep, carry, give birth to, and raise the child who will be named "Yochanan," meaning "God is Gracious," known later to Christians everywhere as John the Baptist. Again, forget Archangel Gabriel and imagine the sacrifice of a maiden named Mary who, by cultural definition was a young and unmarried woman, who agreed to conceive, keep, carry, give birth to, and raise a son to be named "Yeshua," meaning "Savior," known later to Christians everywhere as Jesus. Despite being the Messiah, more likely than not he was going ruin her engagement to a good man named Joseph, cause her to be abandoned by her own family, and end up on the street with the Son of God as beggars, assuming she did not get stoned by outraged villagers first. Then consider Elizabeth's son John's eventual sacrifice. In preparation for his ministry as the forerunner and messenger of the Messiah, he left behind his comfortable lifestyle as the son of a Temple priest, ended his own hereditary training as a Temple priest, its lifetime job security, and enviable standard of living, and withdrew into the wilderness to make ready his ministry to "prepare the way for the coming of the Lord," a ministry that would end up getting him beheaded by a king.

And what about Mary's son Jesus' later sacrifice? Not only did Mary not get stoned to death, and not only did he and Mary not end up as beggars on the streets, but Mary's fiancé Joseph decided

to wed her anyway, pretended Jesus was his own son during her pregnancy, rescued him from an assassination plot involving mass-murder after he was born, and then went on to raise him as his own son among other sons and daughters. Joseph even taught Jesus to be a carpenter and probably a stonecutter like himself. Regardless, like his cousin John the Baptist before him, Jesus gave all of this up and very possibly followed John as a disciple for a period of time. After being baptized by John in the River Jordan, Jesus retreated into the wilderness for 40 days where he fasted, prayed to, and meditated with God, and where he was mercilessly tempted by Satan. Emerging from the wilderness confirmed as the Messiah, Jesus spent the next three years of his life engaged in a ministry of salvation, reuniting and reconciling people with God so they might be redeemed and resurrected by God. In the process, Jesus not only defied all of the religious and political authorities of Israel and Rome, but his tireless efforts ended up getting him betrayed by one of his own friends and disciples, arrested for heresy and treason, tried for these crimes before two courts, and crucified on the Cross.

Lent is about personal sacrifice. However, in my mind, even more than that, Lent is also about confirmation. It means to confirm, similar to Jesus confirming in his own heart, mind, body, and soul that he was up to the challenge of being the Messiah, that with the inspiration, guidance, and leadership of the Holy Spirit, we are up to the challenge of being his disciples. Like Jesus, who chose God's Will over his own will in the wilderness over 2,000 years ago, Lent is about us choosing Jesus' will over our own wills in our own personal wildernesses today. Instead of selfishly choosing to serve ourselves, Lent is about altruistically choosing to follow Jesus and serving our neighbors, by definition the Images of God, a God Who is as fully revealed in Jesus as collectively revealed in us.
