JOY!



Last year the day after
Easter one of my twins went
for their Easter candy before
breakfast. I reminded them
that there is no candy before
breakfast. The other
qualified "except on Easter"
they were allowed to eat a
piece of candy before
breakfast. Without a pause

the twin reaching for the candy stated that it was still Easter season and proceeded to eat a piece. I realized together they had outsmarted me! Did you know that Easter is a season as well?

Often we pick up forms of devotion during Lent-extra prayers, extra readings, etc. We also have been beginning our services during Lent with the penitential order of joining in a prayer of confession first. Easter is often seen as the end of the fast when everyone goes back to eating chocolate or has finished the 40 days of devotional reading.

What if we all used the season of Easter as a time to celebrate joy? Not just in church as we return to proclaiming, "Alleluia," but in the rest of our lives as well. I invite you to think about what brings you joy in life. Now take the time to schedule appointments for you to engage in joyous activities. For example, if nature brings you great joy, plan a time for a walk or a day to spend at your favorite beach. If

friends or family bring you joy, take the time now to plan extra times with them- a meal, a special outing, or maybe just some extra Facetime if they live far away.

Pastoral Note: Choosing to find times to practice joy can be a spiritual discipline. It does not mean that depression or grief will go away or that you are wrong in feeling those feelings. It only means setting aside times when you participate in something that has brought joy in the past. Your family may still fight over politics and rain may come on the day you planned to spend at the beach. God is in the Good Friday moments as much as God is in the Easter celebrations!

The joy of the resurrection of Jesus is not to be limited to times when we are gathered together in worship. We are each called to celebrate that joy in our lives.

This Easter Season let us go out with joy and be led forth with peace!


The youth attended an Interfaith Vigil service at the National Cathedral, met with some of our Hawaii delegation, toured some of the government buildings and museums, and took in some of the other sites in the nation's capital.

The march started in front of the Capitol and stretched back about nine city blocks (almost 3/4 of a mile) with organizers estimating the crowd size in excess of 800,000.

Vestry Highlights - March 2018



The vestry met on March 13, 2018. Highlights of this meeting include:

- Jose Henao was appointed to serve as Clerk of the Vestry
- Treasurer Martha Morgan announced that the 2018 pledges received to date total \$211,192
- Approved naming Pastor Heather Hill and Parish Administrator Carolyn Koehler to sign for the distribution of

our portion of the IRA left to us by Shirley McKown

- Resolved to hire C & B Quality Painting LLC to remove the lead and paint the church
- Jr. Warden Mary Carpenter noted that we should be receiving a payment of approximately \$5,000 from our insurance company for our claim for church roof damage
- Mary Carpenter also announced that parishioners can donate a gallon of paint for \$50 per gallon
- Voted to designate \$1,000 from the Vestry Discretionary Fund toward the costs of the Washington D.C. March for Our Lives participants

- Reaffirmed the applicability of the Diocesan Safeguarding Policy and each attendee signed same
- Approved the 2017 Parochial Report which includes membership and financial information
- Heard announcements that:
 - 1) Andrew Arakawa, a seminarian, will be serving as an intern at St. Clement's from May 13 to June 26;
 - 2) the last day of Sunday School before the Summer will be on June 24;
 - 3) the Bishop will be visiting St. Clement's on September 8; and
 - 4) the next meeting of the Welcome Committee will be at 8:30 am on Sunday, April 22.

Washington, DC

Note: The following is from an email that Jill Haworth sent upon arriving home from the "March for Our Lives" in Washington D.C. The internet links at the end are to a news story that appeared on television the day of the march and to the interview that Tanner, Pamela, and Naomi had on Hawaii News Now Sunrise before leaving for Washington. Be sure to watch them both. We can be very proud of our parish representatives.

It's been an amazing experience for our students that had the privilege of being at the March for Our Lives, 2018 in Washington, D.C.

The Interfaith Prayer Vigil at the National Cathedral and the March for Our Lives were inspiring; couple this energy with talking to people and legislators on our journey to the March has fired up our students in talking about what's next.

On the day of the March, we were hosted by St. Mark's Episcopal Church on Capitol Hill - a place to store our luggage and to warm up with lively conversation and refreshments before hitting the streets. Truly we were proud to carry our signs high with the motto based on a prayer we heard at the vigil: "Hearts be brave! Hearts be bold! March 4 Aloha!!" After the March, as we returned to St Mark's, the kids sought out individuals to share the kukui lei that was given to us to wear by St. Clement's. We were asked to wear the lei during the March and to share them afterward with other marchers. Volunteers registering people to vote (picture on pg 5), national guards, Capitol police, and volunteers at St Mark's were touched by the student's aloha. What a perfect way to enter into Holy Week!

After viewing the new Obama portraits at the National Portrait Gallery, Pam asked if we could see the 1813 American flag. Although we couldn't take pictures, we were just in awe. Pam commented that she loved being able to see the things that she has read about and the fact that our group of youths had become closer.

The students are so thankful for this once in a lifetime opportunity and the outpouring of love and support they have received throughout the planning and the entire trip. They are already talking about their new-found responsibility to continue their fight to make a change. We've been discussing voter registration in Hawaii and ways to change the apathy in voter turnout in our state... and homelessness. Meg has asked why there isn't a March for homelessness.

Hope.

I am so privileged and thankful, along with my fellow chaperones Kimberly Frank and Ajaol Siyami, to bear witness to so much love and hope.
