From Pastor Heather



Hymn 76 vs. 4 To heal the sick stretch out thine hand, and bid the fallen sinner stand; shine forth, and let thy light restore earth's own true loveliness once more.

I love Advent hymns! Christmas music seems to be everywhere from long before Thanksgiving. Advent music is hard to find

and I search high and low to listen to it. The themes in Advent music include light shining in a dark world, and John the Baptist's cries to make the paths straight.

It seems that each year a different hymn speaks to where I am and how I am feeling. Most of the Advent hymns in The Hymnal 1982, the one in our pews that we use the most, are found between #53 and #76. There are some scattered in other sections of the hymnal, but the bulk are right before the Christmas music and often overlooked.

Hymn 76, whose words were written by Charles Coffin (1676-1749) and translated by Charles Windred Douglas (1867-1944), begins with images of John the Baptist proclaiming on the banks of the Jordan River. Verse four on the first read through seems to be written as a prayer to Christ to act and make the world more like the kingdom of God.

On closer reading, I see it as a call to each of us as we prepare for the coming of Christ...To heal the sick stretch out your own hand and help them, tell the sinner who has fallen to rise up once more, let your own light shine on earth so that others can see the loveliness of God's world. Be the one who uses your hand, your mouth, yourself to help God's kingdom to shine out in your neighborhood.

So often I hear people say that someone else's actions brought them hope in a world filled with such despair. We are called in the hymns of Advent and the message of John the Baptist to be the one who brings light to the world. We are called to make the road easier for

someone else to travel upon it, to bring healing to a broken world.

I urge you this Advent to seek out ways to act in the spirit of Advent. To bring healing: go grocery shopping for someone who is sick, call a friend or family member who may be lonely, write a card of care to someone who has been having a hard time in life. Have we not all been the fallen sinner at one point or another in our lives? Reaching out with God's mercy and love, we can encourage each other to see ourselves as the beloved children of God that we are.

Together living out the call of Advent we can let God's light shine in and thru us so that the amazing wonderfulness of God's world can be seen once more!

'Āina Aloha exhibit at Bishop Museum







Parishioners were treated to a special "insider" tour of the 'Āina Aloha exhibit at the Bishop Museum by artist and St. Clementian, Meleanna Meyer. Above Mele is describing the creative and collaborative process behind this unique two-sided hanging mural. On one side are literal and figurative representations of the historical and mythological origins of Hawai'i and the Hawaiian culture. The reverse side of the mural (not pictured) features in shades of red an abstract representation of the anger, frustration, and personal pain experienced by the artists and more broadly by the Hawaiian culture caused by years of suppression and cultural displacement. 



A View from the Pew



"We all struggle with free will, with God's Will, and how the two coexist."

Actually, this is not entirely true. Many of us have rejected the free will altogether, contending everything which has ever happened, everything which is

happening now, and everything which will happen is God's Will. If this is true, however, it necessarily divides those of us who think so into two camps. One camp believes that God's Will is a constant, like God, unchanging, and as a result everything in our past, present, and future has been predetermined by God. Inversely, the other camp believes that God's Will and, as a result, God, is arbitrary, maybe even capricious. At best everything in our past, present, and future has been, is, and will be subject to the constantly as well as instantly changing judgments of God, judgments which are contingent solely upon the discretion of God as forethoughts, thoughts, and even afterthoughts.

On the other hand, many of us reject God's Will having a role in human affairs, or even that God's Will exists at all, whether we believe in God or not. Regardless of faith or ideology, we contend that everything which has ever happened, everything which is happening now, and everything which will happen is entirely the result of our own free will, good, bad or amoral, individually and collectively, and even if it involves capitulating to the free will of others who are more powerful or at least more influential than us. Ironically, as chaotic as it sounds, out of this emerges a nature-based form of predetermination embodied in Newton's Third Law in Physics, which says that for every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction, even when the "action" is a "non-action." In other words, paradoxically, our own free will through our interactions with one another have determined, are determining, and will determine everything that has happened in the past, is happening in the present, and will happen in the future. Moreover, if we take this to its logical as it is distressing extreme, everything that has happened since "the beginning" (whenever it was and whatever it is), everything that is happening now, and everything that will ever happen, even in the apparent "lawlessness" of human affairs, arose, is arising, and will arise out of how the most fundamental forces of the "pre-Universe" (whatever that was) interacted with one another. Put another way, even before the most primordial subatomic particles were formed in the instant after the Big Bang, not to mention the Singularity before it, the next meal you consume, assuming you even get one, will not be determined by your free will, let alone your palette or resources, but was predetermined by Nature itself, 13 to 14 billion years ago.

Which brings me to Rubik's Cube. I kid you not. I have a love-hate relationship with this puzzle. I love it because it is absolutely ingenious, and I hate be because, try as I might, I have never solved the puzzle, and I'm way too proud to ask for help or go online to follow the most popular algorithms which will solve it. However, despite my vain dilemma, what I really love about Rubik's Cube is how analogous it is to the interaction of our own free will with God's Will. It's not a perfect analogy of course, as if there could be a perfect analogy for anything involving God, but if we pause to think, it is as illuminating as it can be enlightening.

The Rubik's Cube ("Cube") is made up six faces, each with a single, solid, different color. There are 9 smaller cubes ("cubes") making up each of its 6 faces, for a total of 26 cubes instead of 27 because the center space in the Cube is empty for the mechanism which allows all 6 of the Cube's faces to rotate independently. Eight of the cubes share 3 faces of the Cube, another 12 of the cubes share 2 faces of the Cube, and 6 more of the cubes ~ the ones found in the middle of the six faces of the Cube ~ each occupy only one face.

The goal of the puzzle, after the cubes and their colors have been effectively randomized by repeated rotations, is to return the Cube to its original state in which each of its faces are again a single, solid, different color. Given there are 9 faces of cubes on each of the 6 faces of the Cube, and given that all 6 of the faces on Cube can rotate independently in both directions, this means that, if you can do the math (easier said than done), there are over 43,000,000,000,000,000,000 (quintillion) permutations, possible arrangements of the Cube, which are involved in attempting to return it to its original state of 6 faces with a single, solid, different color. Now, while 43 quintillion is not infinite, practically speaking, for the purposes of this analogy, it might as well be.

So, what's the analogy? It's this: God's Will is the Rubik's Cube, with all 6 of its faces in its intended state of each having a single, solid, different color. Our free will is the 26 smaller cubes, 9 of which jointly make up each of the 6 faces of the Cube, with each face rotating independently, in both directions. The goal, with our lives having effectively randomized God's Will (the intended state of the Cube) with the challenges presented to us in this Human Experience, is to "arrange" our free will (again, the cubes) in such a way by rotating the faces of the Cube back and forth, this way and that, so the faces of the cubes (again, our free will) return the faces of the Cube to its intended state (again, God's Will), where each of the 6 faces of the Cube, consists of the faces of 9 cubes, with each face having the same single, solid, different color, in other words, the same Will.
