Lent: a mysterious journey with the Divine into the messiness of life and death



The newspaper reports: "Twelve Marines die onthe-job and in the prime of their life;" "thirty-one workers killed in employment-related deaths in 2015." Individuals who were friends, family and colleagues: loved and cared for in life, remembered and mourned in death.

In less than two weeks, the church around the world will once again turn its heart and mind to the cross of Christ. In our 40 day Lenten preparation for the joys of Easter, we walk first to the cross, where Jesus of Nazareth paid the ultimate price: an innocent victim; mocked, abused, beaten and brutally killed.

Whether in the recent, sudden deaths of military personnel, or in the deaths of every-day workers in the place of employment, the search for meaning, the search for the "why," becomes suddenly, tragically real.

Ultimately the penitential season of Lent is such a search for meaning. Such questions as the nature of life and death, the meaning and purpose of existence, the problem of suffering, and the terror of war: all of these questions find place in a Lenten journey.

On Ash Wednesday, February 10, we'll begin this walk together again, reminded of the earthly mortality which paradoxically unites us all. To affirm and to accept this mortality, the fact that from "dust we come" and "to dust we shall return" is a human struggle, perhaps the ultimate struggle, away from ego, and towards Christ's cross.

The radiant transcendence of Easter will come again, there is no doubt. Christ has indeed triumphed over evil and death in his resurrection, showing the world that violence – the ultimate earthly weapon – will always be proved futile and worthless.

But in this world, the glorious radiance of that Easter victory often seems to filter into our existence dimly, darkened in and through the vast expanse of human suffering and bodily death.

The church during Lent – sometimes beautifully, sometimes clumsily – attempts to express all of this. It attempts the expression of *earthly reality*, and the acceptance (or at least the acknowledgement!) of it. In this way, we find somehow, in some mysterious, other-worldly way, a Divine presence, a life giving Spirit, who wants to walk in the messiness of life and death with us.

This month we continue our segment from the Goldings, where we examine some commonly used Australian words and the American English counterparts!

In Australia, when you have to deal with some... you know what!... you don't grab a diaper; you reach for a nappy!

The word "diaper" dates from the 14th century, from Old French "diaspre" which referred to ornamental, diamond (or other patterned) cloth, perhaps originally from the Greek for white ("aspros") as in, a thoroughly white cloth, interspersed with other colors or patterns. While modern dictionaries continue to retain these meanings as current, perhaps the most common American English usage is "a basic garment for infants consisting of folded cloth or other absorbent material drawn between the legs and fastened around the waste." This usage has become common since the 1950s, but has been traced back to England in the 1590s.

FROM THE GOLDING FAMILY

Australian-United States Word of the Month nappy, a.k.a. diaper

The word "nappy" is an abbreviation of "napkin." The word "napkin" also dates from the 14th century, literally meaning, "a small tablecloth." The middle English, "naperie" referred to linen objects, sheets, tablecloths, napkins and so on ("apron" is also related!) In modern Australian English usage, it has come to be known as a piece of towelling or other absorbent material which absorbs or retains human waste product. In Australian colloquial usage, "nappy valley" is a locality (usually a district within a city) in which large number of young families reside.

Differences in the Australian English (which in this case has followed British English) and the American English may be due to the fact that the English usage of "diaper" referred to above, was imported into North America during colonization and simply stayed. Following this, patterned weave type fabrics continued to be used for babies in the U.S. when they began to be mass produced in the 19th century. However, in Australia, white terry towelling fabric became more popular for babies (hence "napkin," then "nappy") while the older usage of "diaper" (above) continued to be used to refer to more general patterned material.

A View from the Pew



"Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom."

~ The Apostle Paul, 2 Corinthians 3:17 ~

When the Primates of the Anglican Communion suspended the Episcopal Church USA for three years because we

consecrate same-sex marriages, it was a culmination of years of censure, beginning with our full inclusion and ordination of women, and then the full inclusion and ordination of gay women and men. It reminds me of Jesus' ministry over 2000 years ago. He was not crucified and early Christians were not suppressed just because he and his followers believed he was the Messiah. It was also because he and his followers branched out their ministry from exclusively men to include women, the ritually unclean, the Samaritans, and, God forbid, pagan Gentiles like you and me.

However, it also reminds me of the parable of The Vine in the Gospel according to John. After our suspension in January, I am convinced now more than ever that the traditional translation is in error, that the error was no mistake, and that it was made originally to serve the purposes of religious leaders just like the Primates of the Anglican Communion. They would call me unschooled at best, a heretic at worst, and cynical without a doubt, but the questionable verses read:

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. ²He <u>removes</u> every branch in Me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit He <u>prunes</u>* to make it bear more fruit. ³You have already been <u>cleansed</u>* by the Word that I have spoken to you. ⁴Abide in Me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in Me. ⁵I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in Me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from Me you can do nothing." (John 15:1-5)

Yet, if you go back to the Koine Greek in which John was first written, instead of "He <u>removes</u> every branch" in Verse 2, the literal translation into English is "He <u>lifts up</u> every branch". And instead of "He <u>prunes</u> to make it bear more fruit" it is "He <u>cleanses</u> to make it bear more fruit." Read in this original light, the parable of The Vine takes on a much different meaning, especially in the context of the very next verse which was correctly translated into English and says, "³You have already been <u>cleansed</u>" by the Word that I have spoken to you." In other words, as opposed to a parable about an unrelenting

vine master removing branches which bear no fruit, it becomes the story of our Lord and Savior lifting us up out of the morass and cleansing us of that which is keeping us down so we can be fruitful. It is a story of baptism in the most literal sense of the word and, I dare say, maybe the Word itself.

If ours is a faith about removing unfruitful branches from the vine, Peter would never have become "The Rock" upon which Christianity was built, Paul would not have been the catalyst of the early Christian Church, and none of us would be Christians today. Jesus would have limited his ministry only to Jewish men in good standing according to The Law as interpreted by religious authorities of the day. Mary, Jesus' mother, would have been a mere vessel for His birth instead of being his unwavering disciple. Mary Magdalene, a strangely single Jewish woman leading a strangely un-Jewish life, would not have been the courageous disciple who first witnessed the Resurrection, and Jesus' male disciples would have remained ignorant, hiding in fear. Lazarus, ritually unclean and an outcast because of his leprosy, would not have been raised from the dead and cured of leprosy by Jesus, nor would he have become a stalwart among the disciples. What about the Samaritan woman, a heretic by Jewish standards and married five times? By her faith alone Jesus traveled to her hometown and brought salvation. Then there is the Roman Centurion, a pagan, an officer in an army that conquered Israel and Judea. He bowed before Jesus because his servant, clearly a good friend and probably his lover, was paralyzed and he saved his life. Even in Jesus' own experience, he had never witnessed such a faith as the Centurion's.

The question is not about us choosing between the Anglican Communion and the Episcopal Church USA. The question is, do we lift up our brothers and sisters or do we put them down?
