We are excited and look forward to seeing each parish member at one of the gatherings over the next several months.







- Brunch was catered by Tai Pan Dim Sum (owner Sarah Loui) with assistance from Liz Baldwin and friends Sandy and Wendy Kojima.
- The 2018 Annual Report and the 2019 Parish Directory were distributed.
- Jose Henao was elected Junior Warden.
- Chris Hacskaylo, Glenn Moir, and Holoua Stender were elected for 3 year terms on the Vestry.
- Mary Carpenter was elected to fill the final 2 years of Jose Henao's term on the Vestry.
- Dana Anderson, Mary Carpenter, Trey Frank, Chaz Hill, Cathy Overstreet, and Susan Palmore were elected delegates to the next Diocesan Convention.
- Pastor Heather announced that Michelle Comeau will serve as the Senior Warden for 2019.
- Verbal reports were given by representatives of St. Clement's School, the School Board, the Junior Warden, the Treasurer (including the announcement that 2018 ended with a surplus of over \$11,000), the coordinator of Makiki Farmers Market, and the Rector.

# A View from the Pew



"Now the heavens and the earth were completed and all their host. And God completed on the seventh day

the work God had done.

And God **ceased** on the seventh day from all the work God had done.

And God blessed the seventh day and made it Holy.

For thereon God ceased from all the work of Creation God had done."

Genesis 2:1-3 / The Complete Jewish Bible

Epiphany is almost over and, the question begs, will epiphanies never **cease**? I hope not.

Epiphany comes from the Greek "epipháneia," a compound of the Greek "epi," meaning appropriate or fitting, and "phaino," meaning reveal or appear. Yet, in our haste to uncover what we consider paramount mysteries past and present, we often overlook small but important clues which would help us solve them. For example, take the above passage from Genesis. Almost every Christian Bible translates from Hebrew into English that God "rested" on the seventh day of Creation. On the other hand, most Jewish Bibles translate God "ceased" or "abstained" from further Creation. The Jewish Bibles which do translate "rest" do so in the context of God "desisting" from God's labor, meaning what God had been doing the previous "six days." In Islam, the translation of the Koran from the Arabic is the same, to "cease" or "abstain," along with a gentle reminder to their Jewish and Christian siblings who translate "rest," their fellow "Children of the Book," that God never "rests."

I bring this up because, as we all know, Church attendance and membership has dropped over the past 40 years, not only in our Episcopal denomination, but in the Christian religion overall, and it is no different with any other religion in this country or elsewhere, in particular the developed world. I cannot speak about other religions or denominations, but the Episcopal Church has a number of initiatives at the national, diocesan, and parish levels addressing this issue which, if we think about it, is not about "attendance" or "membership," but about the spiritual well-being of everyone close to us and distant, near to us and far away, now and in the future. These initiatives have identified a number of reasons for the decline. I won't list them all. In fact, I won't mention a single one, as we all share many of the same conclusions. However, there is one reason I have not seen identified, at least not clearly, and that is our disassociation between encountering, worshipping, and having union with God.

It was not long ago in human history and development when it never occurred to us that our bodies, minds, and souls might be separate. We were one. We were singular and, in the Judeo-Christian tradition at least, you see this awareness revealed not only in the stories of the Prophet Elijah in the Old Testament and Jesus Christ in the New Testament with their respective bodily ascensions into Heaven, but in the debates about the Resurrection between Jewish Sadducees and Pharisees, as well as in the Letters of the Apostle Paul about the nature of us being mutually inclusive members of the Body of Christ. In fact, we considered ourselves one with God, too, if only because God created us in God's own image, meaning God is revealed in us, and vice versa.

There was a time in our relationship with God when our encounters with, worship of, and union with God were similarly one and the same thing. I am not suggesting our rites, rituals, and ceremonies now separate us from God, nor our clergy and lay ministers for that matter. On the contrary, all of these naturally arose and evolved from our encounters with, worship of, and union

with God. I am arguing, however, as we become more dualistic in the ways we look at ourselves, Creation, and God, that we have separated ourselves from ourselves, from Creation, and from God, so that it only follows we have likewise separated ourselves from our rites, rituals, and ceremonies we created to encounter, worship, and have union with God. We have arrived at a point, whether we realize it or not, where many if not most of us participate in these rites, rituals, and ceremonies for the sake of the rites, rituals, and ceremonies themselves. Moreover, as we realize "the Emperor has no clothes," instead of questioning ourselves, our dualism, and the dualistic spiritual world we have created for us and one another, we blame the rites, rituals, and ceremonies for our dilemma, ponder our belief and faith in God, and we stay home and sleep in.

I have no epiphany. What occurs to me, however, especially in the many vivid and colorful stories in the Old Testament, which most of us interpret as random festivities, celebrations, and revelries among the faithful, is that the faithful were in actuality worshipping God in the Temple. No doubt there were many rules to abide by, and no doubt Temple priests were hovering nearby to ensure the rules were followed. Yet, within this environ, the music, the dancing, and the singing was, for all practical purposes, not just unchoreographed, but spontaneous.

These people were the faithful, in the Temple, in the presence of God and one another, communing with one another in the Name of God and, as a result, communing with God's very self. Even more, in the process of revealing and reveling in their love of God in these very simple, joy-filled ways, they were revealing and reveling in their love for one another too, their fellow images of God. In my very being, my body, mind and soul, these scenes in the Temple shout-out God revealed in the people, just as much as they shout-out the people revealed in God. God was there, really there, if only because the people were there in God's name, and God was singing and dancing, clanging and crashing cymbals, too.
