In January we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany. This feast is not much recognized in our culture. Not many Americans know that the 12 days of Christmas do not occur before Christmas but are, rather, the twelve days between Christmas and January 6th (the Epiphany). In many places around the world the Christmas gift-giving occurs not on

Christmas day but on Epiphany. It makes sense when you think about it. The magi gave gifts to the Christ-child so the holiday gift-giving should occur on the Epiphany.

The feast of the Epiphany celebrates the manifestation of the messiah to the gentile world. Jesus is made manifest. Jesus is shown to the world so that the world can recognize him as the messiah.

Have you ever wondered if you would have recognized the significance of the star that the magi followed? How many others saw that star in the sky and did not follow it?

Have you ever wondered if you would have recognized Christ during his earthly ministry? So many of those Jesus met in his earthly life did not.

So us --- would we have recognized him? Why might we have failed to do so?

Oh, we all like to believe that if we had lived during his time we would have been one of his followers. We would have been different than most of the crowds. We would have gladly left everything to follow him.

Really? Haven't we ever seen or touched him? Jesus is present every day. Have we never heard him? He speaks to us in the Gospels. Have we never met him? 'I was hungry, and you fed me. I was thirsty. I was a stranger...'

Jesus is present in our neighbor, our in-laws, the clerk in the grocery store, and the telemarketer. Jesus is present in the 99% and in the 1%. Jesus is made manifest in those around us each and every day. The Epiphany celebrates the magi recognizing the baby Jesus as the messiah. The Epiphany also celebrates us recognizing Jesus as present and manifest in all those we meet. We only need open our eyes to see.

I pray for you all a blessed Twelfth Night and Epiphany.

The vestry met on December 13, 2016. Highlights of the December meeting include:

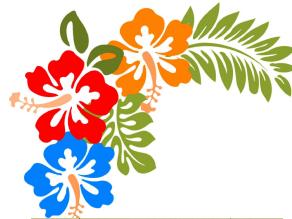
- Discussed potential vestry member and diocesan convention delegate nominees

St. Clement's Annual Fundraiser: Punahou Carnival Parking February 3 and 4, 2017



It's that time of year again... St. Clement's annual Punahou Carnival parking fundraiser will held be on **Friday, February 3 and Saturday, February 4**. Please volunteer for:

GATE KEEPER: Stand at the entrance and ask if the car will be there long term or short term and tell a Runner who will guide the car to a space to park.

RUNNERS/SPOTTERS: Will guide a car to a space. Collect the money and keys and write a receipt. Deliver cash, key, and receipt to the cashier at the Key Table. Will guide Parking Attendants to ensure safe maneuvering while driving. This is mainly at night or during really busy times.

PARKING ATTENDANTS: Will move a car, if needed. At times assist customers with parking. **No cars leave the grounds.**

KEY TABLE - Cashiers: Collect money, key, and receipt from the Runners. Give any change, if needed. Trace license numbers with a black Sharpie.

KEY TABLE - Key Bagger: File the bag alphabetically by license number (or under vanity for those special license plates) with receipt facing out for easy view and retrieval.

Rector Search Committee: Update



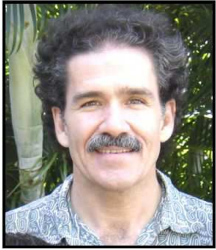
The Rector Search Committee completed a draft of the Parish Profile and submitted it to the Vestry at its December 13th meeting for their review and revisions. A revised draft will be submitted to Bishop Robert Fitzpatrick for his review and revisions in early January. The Bishop's review is expected to take less than a week.

Once final revisions are made, the Parish Profile and the position announcement will be posted on St. Clement's website. The Search Committee will work with the Bishop's Office to post an electronic version of the Parish Profile on the national Office for Transition Ministry site. The Bishop's Office will also facilitate posting the position announcement on the diocesan website, digital publications, and through the diocesan Transition Ministers' network.

A View from the Pew

There is a crack in
everything. That's how
the light gets in.
-Leonard Cohen



It is Epiphany, the season after Christmas when we recall the ways in which God reveals God's Self in and through Jesus. It is when we remember God being revealed in Jesus while still an infant in Bethlehem during the quest of the Wise Men, Kings, or Magi as described in the Gospel According to Matthew. In the Gospels according to Mark, Matthew, and Luke, we

remember God being revealed in Jesus as a young man through his baptism in the river Jordan by his second cousin, John the Baptist. The Voice of God is heard and the Holy Spirit ~ in the visage of a dove ~ descends upon him, with whom God was most pleased. After emerging from 40 days in the wilderness meditating with and praying to God, as well as resisting the temptations of Satan, we remember Jesus' first public miracle in the Gospel according to John. Attending a wedding in Cana with his mother and disciples, the reception runs out of wine. Jesus tells the servants of the house to fill with water large stone jars normally reserved for ritual baptism and purification by Jewish law. After the jars are filled, Jesus directs them to draw a pitcher full and deliver it to the wedding steward who, upon tasting it, discovers it transformed into fine wine.

All of these Gospel revelations of God in and through Jesus are fine and good, but in my mind they are the easy part of Epiphany. Except for incorrigible cynics, of whom tragically there are many, being in the presence of a miracle is utterly revealing. Instead, Epiphany reminds me of Jesus, in his Sermon on the Mount, admonishing us all that it is easy to love our families, friends, and neighbors, but until we can love our enemies, too, we are not capable of fully loving God. Epiphany means perceiving God in us all ~ family, friends, and neighbors, and even our enemies. Epiphany is seeing God in all people, from every nation, ethnicity, culture, and language group. Epiphany is recognizing God is present in everyone, regardless of how dark or light our universally brown skin may be. Epiphany is realizing that, even if we disagree, and even if we disagree violently, we are all still the children of God, brothers and sisters in the family of God, and as a result, like children who share biological parents, we are mutually the Images of God, the One God, the Only God and, as Unseen as God may be, Our God.

As counter-intuitive as it seems, it is through our manifold flaws that we are united, and through our delusions of rightness that we are kept apart. If we are all so right, and we all certainly seem to believe we are, then how is it that we all likewise seem to think everyone else is wrong? Our jointly held "rightness," which ought to equate into everything being or becoming "right," ironically

extinguishes itself. Absurdly, it is only when we admit we are wrong, or at least not absolutely right, that there is room for us to come together and improve upon our previously and seemingly irreproachable misperceptions of ourselves and each other, as well as misconceptions of our world. Put another way, it is only by putting aside our self-righteousness, which singularly separates us all, are we able to reunite with one another and, being the Images of God, reunite with God. In other words, it is our cherished rightness that separates us from one another and, consequently, from God.

In a twisted way, our fallibility is the ultimate revelation in this season of Epiphany. The ancient Hebrew word for sin, "chata," which originally was an archery term meaning "to miss" or "be off" the mark, did not mean doing something wrong or evil, even though "the mark" clearly implied God. Instead, sin meant the further from God we are, the more likely evil will arise in our lives, in the lives of others, and in the world around us. Transposed, however, being collectively the Images of God, the closer we come to be or are with one another, the more we complete God's Image, and the more likely faithfulness and goodness will reveal Itself more abundantly in us all.

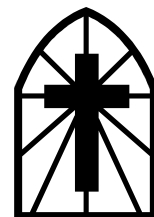
