Can I get a welcome?

Hospitality and Welcoming the Stranger in Our Midst

I wanted to share a few stories of experiences I have had visiting other worshipping communities, both good and bad. Before I moved to my current parish but after I had finished serving at my last parish, my fiancé (now husband) and I worshipped with two other Episcopal churches. We decided to go without any indication that we were priests (incognito-no collars, etc.) so that we could just participate and worship without drawing extra attention. We chose the first church because they worshipped in a higher style than we usually did and thought it would be an interesting experience. The second church we chose because it was not far away from where we were and they had a service late enough for us to sleep in a little. Before we went I thought that we would experience people being too eager for us to become involved. We were on the surface what many churches said they were looking for- a young couple who obviously knew and loved the liturgy.

Boy was I wrong! At both parishes nobody spoke to us except for the priest! (One of them knew me because it was not far from the parish I had been serving.) The first service we sat through not knowing much of what was going on, but no one offered us help to understand. They worshipped in a very high church style and had extra special actions because a bishop was visiting that neither of us had seen before. The second church had worship similar to what we knew and we participated fully. The second one even had a time at the end for visitors to stand up and introduce themselves. The priest who knew me looked at me and I shook my head, "no." My husband and I are both introverted and neither of us wanted to make a spectacle of ourselves. We just wanted to worship. So maybe nobody

said hello there because we did not stand up in front of 100 people we did not know to introduce ourselves. At the second parish we then spent 15 minutes wandering around trying to find a bathroom and still no one said hello or asked if they could help. Leaving the second week in a row with the only hint of welcome coming from the priests, I couldn't help but think that it's no wonder the Episcopal Church is losing members. I would not have returned to either place to worship.

In direct contrast to that experience was a worship service I attended recently at a convent in Tiffin, OH. I was attending a retreat there and as part of our schedule we had the option to join the sisters for Vespers, an evening prayer service. I enjoy praying with others in new ways so I went. Two of us from the retreat stepped into the door of the chapel looking around trying to figure out what we should do. Within a minute two sisters who had been sitting at different places in the sanctuary came over and offered to sit with us and help us through the service. Though a little unsure of being approached and wanting to blend in the back (I was at a Roman Catholic convent and was not sure how they would greet me), I agreed. The sister handed us their prayer books and pointed to numbers on a wall. They were code to find the different parts of the service. She turned to me and the other retreatant at each turn of the page to make sure we knew where we were. I finally experienced how even a heart desiring to pray can have trouble navigating multiple pages throughout a book without a guide. After the service, the two sisters thanked us for praying with them and invited us to come to another service they had. It felt so good to be thanked for praying with them, especially because half the time I had no idea what was going on.

I share these experiences with you to help all of us to work together to be a church with genuine hospitality sharing God's love with those who honor us by praying with us. What can you do to help someone who you do not recognize to feel welcome at your parish? How can we as a community make it so everyone feels like they can be included in prayer at our church? The first steps are introducing

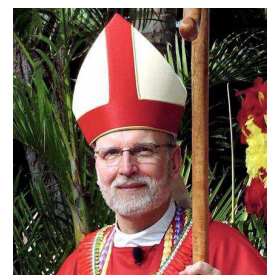
Mental Health First Aid Training

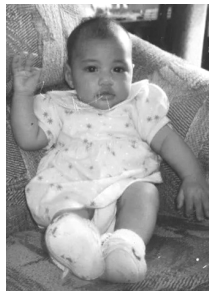
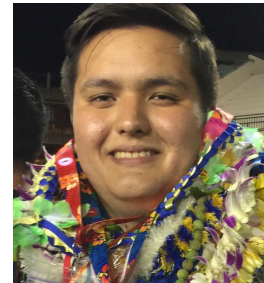
Our 2018 Graduating Seniors

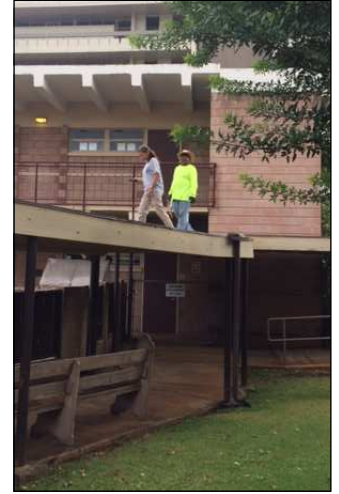
Outreach Sunday, June 2018

What's in a Cross?

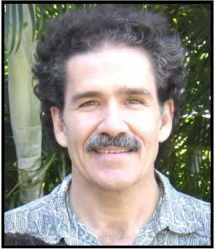

A View from the Pew



“Let bitterness, wrath, anger, clamor and evil speech be put away from you, and so too all malice.”

The Apostle Paul / Ephesians 4:31-32

Across the board, narcissistic behavior and feelings of entitlement - virtually indivisible mentalities – are colossal threats not only to secular society, but to our spiritual lives as well. In other words, we have developed such a sense of self-importance which is so exaggerated that we think primarily - if not exclusively - about ourselves, even when “we think we are thinking” about others. Similarly, there is entitlement, our belief that we deserve something which we really don’t, or a great deal more of something that maybe we do. Of course, this being said, upon a single moment of self-examination, I find myself to be one of the most self-centered people I know. In other words, whether we recognize it or not, if we are not careful, “It is all about me” as the popular quip declares/warns.

Not only do we see rampant narcissism and entitlement in ourselves, but we see it in the people around us. It is painfully apparent in our political leaders on “both sides of the aisle,” reminding me of the Greek philosopher Plato who once said, “Only those who do not seek power are fit to hold it.” We see it also in our “captains of industry.” Think of the herbicide Round-Up and how Monsanto corporate leaders have covered up for decades just how acutely carcinogenic it really is. What about our non-profits? It turns out that the top executives for the Wounded Warrior Project - which is supposed to focus on helping our veterans recover mentally, physically, socially and economically from the horrors of their combat experiences - have a hankering for expensive parties, first class travel, posh hotels, and extravagant “meal allowances.” Let’s not forget about our religious organizations. While the Roman Catholic Church still holds our attention for systemic cover-ups of sexual abuse spanning generations, who can forget all of the financial scandals among our mass media Fundamentalist, Evangelical, and Pentecostal churches in the latter half of the 20th Century? Then there is our own Episcopal Church. While we like to think of ourselves as having “open borders” when it comes to gender, it was not long ago when women were prevented from full inclusion in the life of the church, not to mention people who were LGBTQ. If you look into and consider the above controversies, and I would even venture to say scandalous behavior in general, meaning conduct which is immoral, unethical, illegal, and improper, or just plain impudent and unbecoming, that to one degree or another - if not entirely - they were all rooted in narcissism and entitlement.

Even so, I’m not too concerned about organizations and the people leading them. Power corrupts. The more power one has, the more one is corrupted. If one has absolute power, one becomes absolutely corrupt. It is inevitable, though granted it can be harnessed somewhat with appropriate checks and balances. Instead, I care about the rest of us, meaning you and me. If we think narcissism and entitlement is someone else’s problem, then we have a problem, too. Narcissism is the ultimate

form of idolatry. It is why God commanded that we have no other gods except God, and that we do not create and revere images from our imaginations or nature, or worse yet, images of ourselves. Entitlement is no different. It is why Jesus teaches us that we must love God with all our hearts, minds, souls and strength, and that we must love our neighbors as ourselves. To do otherwise, whether we intend it or not, means that we believe we are entitled but that our neighbors are not. And if we believe that our neighbors are not entitled, then we are not loving them as ourselves. And if we are not loving our neighbors, people just like us created by God in God’s own image, then we are not loving God. And if we are not loving God and our neighbors, which are inseparable, meaning mutually inclusive events, then we are not loving ourselves, and in fact are unable to love ourselves, and as a result are entirely unloved. And if we are entirely unloved, we have been spiritually annihilated, and we have done it to ourselves. We have created our own personal Hell, a vacuum, a void in which we are tormented by an emptiness which can never be allayed or satisfied, let alone filled.

But what does this mean? It means that, to elaborate on the Apostle Peter in his First Epistle, as Christians we are people who do not just believe but have faith in and try our best to live out the Way of Jesus Christ. It means that we are to be meek, and that we are to humble ourselves in the service of our neighbors and therefore God. It means that, under the inspiration and guidance of the Holy Spirit, we are to lift up our neighbors and thereby exalt God, and in the process be lifted up and exalted by God. It means that, as opposed to afflicting our neighbors with our selfish burdens they should not bear, that we instead surrender our cares to God, if only because God cares. Our lives as Christians is about being self-less, not self-consumed. It is about being created in God’s image, not creating a false god in our own.

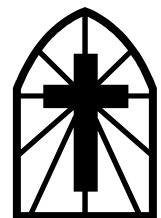
