Lenten Stewardship



I know what you're thinking didn't we just finish passing a budget and why are you talking about Stewardship in Lent? Stewardship is so much more than a number we place on a pledge card. Many people unknowingly examine one part of Stewardship during Lent.

Stewardship is what we do with everything God has given us.

Our time - Have you committed to reading an extra devotion, reading a part of the Bible, or increasing your prayer life during Lent? You are increasing your stewardship of time by giving a little bit more of your time to following God.

Our bodies - Many people choose to change their diet or fast during Lent. You are using your bodies to remember to seek God. Many of the Old Testament/Hebrew Bible laws were designed to help followers to remember God in all aspects of their life including eating and cleaning.

Property Committee Updates

As you undoubtedly read in the Junior Warden's report in the 2017 Annual Report, two big projects are coming up this year - the painting and the reroofing of the church.

Painting. The painting contract is pending the results of lead testing of the existing paint and the level of treatment that may be needed. Painting alone is estimated to be \$40,000 to \$45,000; lead abatement could add as much as \$50,000 to that amount. Regardless, current plans call for the painting to be completed before the roofing can be done.

Roofing. After reviewing several proposals, St. Clement's has contracted with *On Top Roofing* to remove and replace the roofing tiles and to install new rain gutters. The total cost of this contract is about \$207,000.

Schedule. The estimated schedule for the work is:


Elizabeth argues that there is a major corruption in the text of the Gospel of John, in the story of Lazarus being raised from the dead. This argument is based on changes that are made to the oldest existing copy of John 11 (Papyrus 66), but there are traces of similar changes made throughout the gospel's manuscript transmission.

A View from the Pew



"Remember the Sabbath and keep it Holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the Seventh Day is the Sabbath of the LORD."

Moses / Exodus 20:8-10

"A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

The 2nd Amendment / The Constitution

Much like the 2nd Amendment of the United States Constitution regarding our right to bear firearms, the 4th Commandment of The Law, that we keep Holy a Sabbath to the Lord, has been effectively hijacked and usurped by vain and self-serving forces in our society. Sound crazy? Think again.

Both the 4th Commandment and the 2nd Amendment are about freedom. In the Constitution, the 2nd Amendment is clearly addressing the need for a "well regulated Militia." By stating unequivocally it is "necessary to the security of a free State," the 2nd Amendment is not only talking about the original 13 States of the United States of America, it is also talking about Militias formed, armed, and commanded under the auspices of those States, as well as the other 37 States that exist today, not private militias which serve special interests. Further, by stating that "the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed," this very same singular sentence of the 2nd Amendment is clearly stating that the people, as represented by the States in which they live, have not just the right to arm their Militias, but to serve in their Militias, and to bear the arms of their Militias when the security of their States are threatened.

Think. We had just achieved independence in an armed conflict with arguably the most powerful nation in the world, Great Britain. At the time of the writing of our Constitution in 1789, Britain was already planning to take back "the Colonies" as exemplified in the subsequent War of 1812. Private ownership of firearms for the purposes of personal defense and hunting was a given in that day and age, and as a result was never addressed in the 2nd Amendment or any other amendment of our Constitution. In fact, the British, when in control of the Colonies before our Revolutionary War, never once banned the personel ownership of weapons, but they certainly did ban colonial militias and the armories that would have necessarily come with them. In other words, anyone who has studied high school English Grammar and US History ought to know that the 2nd Amendment has nothing to do, whatsoever, with the private ownership of firearms, whether for target shooting, hunting, or personnel defense, and it has everything to do with Militias, under the auspices of the States, having the right to not only keep arms in their armories, but for their Militia members to bear those arms when the freedom of their States are threatened. All interpretations to the contrary are inaccurate, if not fabrications, and they now threaten not only the lives of our children, not to mention the rest us, but the very foundation of our Declaration of Indpendence which boldly declares:

"We hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness."

In the same vein, in Deuteronomy we learn that God did not give us the 4th Commandment, a Sabbath, just so we could worship God. God does not need our worship to exist or to continue to exist, or to maintain or increase God's power, or to be or remain essential. Instead, God gave us the Sabbath to remind us that we were once slaves, literally in terms of base servitude to slave masters, figuratively in terms of sin and Satan, and that it was and is only through God that we were liberated and are free. The Ten Plagues that God beset upon Egypt, whether real, metaphor, or allegory, tell us it is only through God's inspiration, guidance, and leadership that we can escape slavery in body, mind, and spirit, and thus become and stay free. Hence the Sabbath where, as opposed to "rest" from, we literally "cease" and "desist" from what we do the other six days and, on the Seventh Day, come together to give thanks to God for our freedom, to commune with one another in God's Name, and as a result commune with God's very Self. The 4th Commandment is nothing if not revolutionary. It is our declaration of spirtual independence.

So how do we give thanks some 3500 years later? If we are not working, we are studying. When not studying, we are sleeping. Should we not be sleeping, we are practicing. If not practicing, we are competing or performing. When not competing or performing, we are recreating. If we feel guilty about recreating, we do community service. The commutations are as infinate as binary operations in Mathematics and Computer Science. Virtually all of our waking hours have been seized and are now commanded by the work we do, the classes we take, the sports we compete in, the arts in which we create and perform, and even by our recreation and our community service. We have again become slaves, but now to employers, teachers, coaches, instructors, trainers, buddies, and community service organizers who are not satisfied with just six days, but demand all seven. What is worse, it is we who have let them take our Seventh Day, whichever day it is we make our Sabbath. We do it all in the name of getting ahead and staying ahead personally, educationally, atheltically, artistically, recreationally, vocationally, professionally, and of course financially. We do it while knowing that, in the end, in this existential, human, earthly, corporeal experience, it will amount to nothing, absolutely nothing, unless God is the flax with which our lives are woven together into one holy linen. We must take back the Sabbath. It is ours.

"And He said unto them, the Sabbath was made for Man, not Man for the Sabbath. Therefore the Son of Man is also the Lord of the Sabbath."
