Everybody needs beauty as well as bread.

It is just that simple.

For a HUMAN life to be lived, and not just a

sustained life to be lived; it is just that simple. We all need beauty as well as bread.

We all need our basic food needs met (bread), as well as our basic spiritual and beauty needs met (play and pray).

This is all and everything that we as a Christian community should strive for on behalf of all people. This is the mission of the church! That every member of the church should seek to strive so that everyone who needs both beauty and bread should have access to that beauty and bread.

Striving for human dignity is so basic that Maslow included "beauty, balance, and form" on his upper levels of hierarchy of needs for the human being in addition to "bread/food" on his bottom rung the ladder of human needs.

We as Christians are called to help all people up the ladder of Maslow's hierarchy of needs into a more "HUMAN" life. We are called as Christians to help people move from bread to beauty.

The Food Distribution which I had the opportunity to see for the first time in February is a start in this direction. The hot meal and grocery bags provide some sort of "bread" for those who come to our doors. They are part of the bottom rung of Maslow's ladder which addresses mostly, *bread*.

This congregation's on-going concern, education, advocacy, and witness regarding the plight of the Palestinians addresses a different


kind of human need. These events are addressing a higher level of need for human dignity. They are addressing and advocating for more beauty and quality of life on behalf of others.

I have just moved here after living a number of years only 45 minutes away from Yosemite. John Muir was essential in the establishment of the Sierra Club and the establishment of many of our National Parks. His legacy was all around my former diocese...and his calling, as well as Jesus' calling, to us is higher than just bread. John Muir's legacy, and the following of Jesus, calls us into the basic understanding that Jesus had when Jesus called us to address both spiritual and temporal needs. We are to preserve and share the beauty of God's creation which exists all around us but we are also called to invite others into the beauty, sharing, and preserving of God's creation.

We are called not only to provide bread for our neighbors, but also to help preserve the beauty of creation and thereby provide for some of the spiritual needs of our neighbors.

Beauty and Bread. That is what we are all called to be about.

From the desk of Mark Haworth



I cannot believe it has been two years from my first meeting to assemble my discernment committee! As my sponsoring Parish, my home church, and hub of spiritual support, this note is to update the Parish on where I am in the process for ordination to the priesthood.

Currently I am in formation year two of three in Hawai`i's diocesan school of study, Waiolaihui'ia. When I have finished my studies, and passed of course, I will be eligible for ordination to the Transitional Diaconate. Six months or so later, I will then be eligible for ordination to the priesthood. Of course, just finishing the formation studies is

not all I need to do to be accepted. There are a myriad of other very important steps, interviews, discernment groups, diocesan commissions, and committees that will be tasked with helping me discern this very special calling.

The Bishop has assigned me to serve as an intern at St. Elizabeth's in Kalihi, with Father David Gierlach. My start date for this internship will be Palm Sunday, March 20, 2016. I have met with Father David and am looking forward to working with him and St. Elizabeth's in this next phase of formation.

With God's help and the help of the St. Elizabeth's congregation and staff, Father David has instituted programs at St. Elizabeth's that have had tremendous impact on their congregation and their community. Like me, Father David entered into the priesthood at a later stage in his life while fully ensconced in his career. I am very humbled to be sent there, and am looking forward to tremendous personal growth opportunities.

What I am sad about is the fact that I will be leaving my home church for this internship. St. Clement's is where my wife, Jill, was baptized by Dr. Wheeler (Dr. Wheeler also married us 34 years ago), where I discovered God in my heart, where I sang with the choir for over 25 years, where my children were baptized, where my daughter Jessica was married, and where my family (my wife and my son Tanner; my mother-in-law, Betty; my sister-in-law, Gail; my brother-in-law, Scott) loves to be every Sunday. My internship will be approximately a year and a half, taking me right up to the gate of graduation from Waiolaihui'ia. My love and

Don't forget Palestine and Israel this Lent



Throughout the holy season of Lent, and particularly, the climactic 'Holy Week' leading up to Easter Day, the church has often observed an intentional time to pray for the Holy Land. On Good Friday, St.. Clement's has traditionally given any monetary collections on the day to the work of

the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, to support its work of running schools, hospitals, and other institutions across the Middle East that benefit Jews, Muslims, and Christians alike.

While the agonizing Syrian conflict continues, in which the United Nations estimates over 250,000 people have been killed, and approximately 14 million people have been displaced, it is easy for the world to miss the rising tensions in Israel and Palestine.

On February 17, the Coordinator for Humanitarian and United Nations Development Activities for the occupied Palestinian territory, Robert Piper, called for the destruction of Palestinian-owned property in the occupied West Bank be halted. "International law is to be respected," he said. "Over 400 Palestinians have been displaced from their homes... in the first six weeks of 2016." That is "equivalent to over half the total number of Palestinians displaced in all of 2015."

"Palestinians in the West Bank have the right to adequate housing and the right to receive humanitarian assistance," said Mr. Piper. "As the occupying power, Israel is obliged to respect these rights."

283 homes and other structures were "destroyed, dismantled or confiscated" in the period January 1 to February 15, 2016. "Over 100 of these structures had been provided as humanitarian assistance to families in need."

In the wake of such demolitions as part of the occupation of the West Bank, and the ongoing blockade of Gaza, murmurs of a third 'intifada' (or uprising) of Palestinians continue to grow louder.

Most recently, three attempted attacks against Israel Defense Forces soldiers in the West Bank have been reported. On February 21, "a 16-year-old Palestinian was killed after attempting to stab [a soldier] south of Nablus in the West Bank." "East of Hebron a 14-year-old attempted to stab a soldier... and was arrested" on the same day. On February 3, Border Police Officers killed a 20-year-old outside Jerusalem's Damascus Gate, shooting him multiple times in a highly frequented area of the Old City.

So far in 2016, however, the violence continues to be one sided. According to the U.N. in just six weeks, 30 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli forces in the West Bank, while 3 Israelis have died at the hands of Palestinians. This year alone, 882 Palestinians have been injured by Israeli forces. 30 Israelis have been injured. In 2015, 127 Palestinians and 18 Israelis were killed. 13,550 Palestinians and 882 Israelis were injured.

Perhaps in this Lenten time, in reflecting on Middle Eastern conflict, in praying for the people of Palestine and Israel, in reading books and watching movies about the past history and the present situation, in purchasing fair trade goods, in joining organizations, or even considering pilgrimage to see the Living Stones of that great Holy Land, we may find a deeper way into understanding, and perhaps, just perhaps, we may find a pathway to a hopeful, non-violent resolution of conflict, and a road to lasting justice and peace in the Holy Land.

Some of this content was delivered as part of my sermon on the 2nd Sunday in Lent, February 21, 2016.

Watching the movie, "The Lemon Tree" Reading the book, "The Lemon Tree"


Although the movie and the book are the same name, and they both use interpersonal relationships to speak about the conflict and the search for peace and justice in Palestine and Israel, they tell two different stories:

The movie tells the modern day story of a widow who



tends the family lemon grove along the Green Line dividing Palestine from the West Bank. Conflict begins when the Israeli defense minister moves in next door.

It is a parable of the middle east conflict which is brought to life by fantastic acting and down to earth characters



The book, set in 1967, is the story of a Palestinian twentyfive-year-old, who journeyed to Israel, with the goal of seeing the beloved old stone house, with the lemon tree behind it, that he and his family had fled nineteen years earlier. There he meets a nineteen-year-old Israeli college student, whose family fled Europe for Israel

following the Holocaust. On the stoop of their shared home, they began a rare friendship.

This book reminds us that even amid the bleakest political realities there exist stories of hope and reconciliation. A finalist for the National Book Critics Award, highly praised by NPR and The Washington Post, this book is not to be missed.

Copies of the book are available now at the Parish office for \$12.00 (credit card on file can be used as well as cash or check).

Canon Kate and I, together with the Global Ministries Team of the Parish commend the book to you as your 2016 Lenten reading, and also invite you to join the Adult Formation Group (each Sunday 8:45 am - 10:00 am) to watch the movie, and discuss Palestine and Israel through these two mediums.



A View from the Pew



"And forgive us our trespasses . . . just as we forgive those who trespass against us."

~ The Lord's Prayer ~

It's Lent and I've just had an Epiphany! All puns aside, and while I realize I'm "behind the curve" here, it just occurred to me that the cycle of our liturgical calendar year is

symbolic of the natural cycles of life, beginning with Advent, followed by Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. It is all there: conception and cestation; birth and dawning; development and revelation; maturity and realization, death and new life; growth and transformation. Likewise anticipation, inception, manifestation, discernment, sacrifice, and rebirth. All different words, to be sure, with one set addressing the existential and the other the transcendental, but each in their respective spheres nonetheless expressing the very same thing.

The liturgical cycle is an expression of how we ought to be living our lives as the Images of God. We are called to begin and end each day, and to live and die each lifetime, for our sisters and brothers, sacrificing not only so that they may live, but so that we may live, too. It is reminds me of forgiveness. By forgiving instead of destroying our transgressors, we not only liberate them from the spiritual prisons we so zealously build in our hearts, minds, and souls because of their sins against us, but we also free ourselves from living behind the grim walls of these very same prisons we so vehemently guard. Inversely, by choosing to forgive our transgressors, not only will God likewise choose to forgive us in equal measure, but, by our example, our transgressors might likewise choose to forgive those who have sinned against them and, in turn, in the process of this life-giving and life-saving cycle, be forgiven by God, too.

Our liturgical cycle is really about inspiring, guiding, and leading us into a way of life by which we choose to love and live for one another, and in doing so, not only grow closer to our sisters and brothers, but closer to God. It goes to the core meaning of sin and grace. In the ancient understanding of the word, sin did not mean doing something evil. Instead, it meant doing or not doing something that put distance between us and God. To be in a state of sin was to be separated from God. Conversely, the ancient meaning of grace had nothing to do with blessing people or things. Instead, it was a word describing a relationship in which we are intimate with God. To be in a state of grace is to be close to God. In other words, the distance between us and God, while not evil in itself, is the abyss out of which all evil arises. In narrowing the distance between us and God, we can bridge the gap ~ ideally filling it with love ~ and become one with God and our neighbors.

In a very dramatic way, the liturgical cycle brings to mind the infinitely small but nuclear story of Stephan in the Book of Acts, the very first martyr of Christianity, and the Apostle Paul, formerly Saul, who was a Roman citizen and an officer of the Temple in Jerusalem. Stephan was a deacon in the original Church of Jerusalem, serving the Apostle James, Jesus' brother and its first Bishop. As a deacon, Stephan's role was to connect the community with the Church, the risen body of Christ. In the process, he not only incurred the nefarious suspicion of the Roman occupation, but also the wrath of the Jewish religious authorities. As a result, Stephan also caught the attention of Saul, whose duty it was to suppress this heretical Jewish sect called the Nazarenes, otherwise known as Christians. Arrested and brought before the religious authorities for heresy, by his own testimony Stephan was condemned, dragged outside of the city, and stoned to death by a mob organized by Saul himself, but not before Stephan could declare:

"Lord, do not hold this sin against them."

Ironically, but I'm certain not coincidentally, the very next time Saul appears in the Book of Acts, he is on the road to Damascus to persecute more Christians there. In the true spirit of death and new life, sacrifice and rebirth, Saul is blinded by Heavenly Light, he is confronted with his sins by Jesus, he converts to the very faith he was sworn to persecute, and he becomes Paul...

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ~ Jesus, Matthew 22:36-4
