We've got Jesus



At a recent college football game between St. Xavier and Cincinnati (Ohio) Colerain some fans started shouting slogans. With reference to the fact that St. Xavier is an all-male Jesuit school, fans from the Colerain football team started shouting, "We've got girls." In response the St. Xavier fans started shouting, "We've got Jesus."

college football scenario the chant "We've got Jesus" was meant to imply a special relationship to Jesus that was not shared by the other side. It was experienced as offensive when it was experienced as exclusionary.

Perhaps, "We've got Jesus" is only offensive when it implies that "You don't have Jesus." I believe the Gospel calls us to recognize that "We've got Jesus" and because "We've got Jesus" we can and do recognize the Christ in others just as the priest and acolytes acknowledge the presence of Christ in one another.

Perhaps our chant as the Episcopal Church should be, "We've got Jesus...and so do you."

It all seemed in good fun to me until the coach from the Colerain team got quite upset. The rivalry then prompted blogs and letters to both college newsletters about the appropriateness of the "We've got Jesus" chant. As you might imagine, the opinions as to the appropriateness of the chant were as varied as those commenting.

I found myself reflecting on the appropriateness of chanting, "We've got Jesus" or claiming that we have Jesus. When I train acolytes I always like to explain the theology behind the liturgical action that I am training them to do. When teaching acolytes to bow to the priest and sharing with the acolytes the fact that priest will bow back to them, I explain that they bow to the priest not to bow to the person who is the priest but because they recognize the presence of Christ in the priest. The reason that the priest bows back to the acolyte is the same; the priest is recognizing the presence of Christ in the acolyte. I've had many acolytes go home from the training reveling in the fact that the priest reverences the Christ in them.

The chant, "We've got girls" certainly did mean to make fun of the fact that St. Xavier did not have girls. Perhaps in this

I'm just about to leave Australian soil after a seven-night trip here, my first time back after relocating overseas with family in January 2015.

There is something funny about being home, but being away from home, about knowing a country is so much a part of your life, but only one part, about being separated from your motherland by

thousands of miles, but knowing your mother still lives in your heart.

However, this trip, when you set aside the wonderful friends, the great hospitality, and the beautiful landscape, this trip has taught me, or perhaps reminded me, of a deeper longing.

This longing is for a place in the middle of the Pacific, miles from nowhere, on a foundation of lava and sand. This land is a land of pineapples and coconuts, macadamias and plumeria. At its heart beats a spirit of aloha, a breath-filled life which is unique and unmistakable.

Hawai'i, you have entered my aching heart, hugging and kissing memories and foundations built in Australia.

After fifteen months of gently loving me, you have given me more than I could ever have asked for, renewing and transforming my past, and encouraging my new future.

So, Australia, I still call you home, and you are, as always, in my heart. But you'll have to get used to sharing that space with the most complicated, broken, beautiful place that I've ever known. That land of aloha across the seas.

Housing Now



Housing Now is a coalition of faith-based and community groups working to address the issues of homelessness and the shortage of affordable housing in Hawai'i. A number of parishioners at St. Clement's have been attending meetings and participated in a rally at the Capitol to get the legislature to act.

The Problems

- Our affordable housing shortage is at crisis proportions.
- We are #1 for homelessness per capita in the nation.
- 48% of our people are one paycheck away from financial disaster. (3/29/16, Star-Advertiser)
- 25% of our people have trouble making the rent or mortgage payment. (3/29/16, Star-Advertiser)
- If you make the minimum wage and live in a one bedroom apartment, you will work 125 hours per week to pay the rent. (Hawaii Business Magazine)

What to do

- The office of the Governor has recently issued a State of Hawai'i Housing Plan which calls upon the State to build homes that people can afford, including rentals, to address the needs of those entering the workforce. To implement this plan the Governor has sponsored a number of bills which call for funding the Rental Housing Revolving Fund (RHRF), the Hawai'i Public Housing Authority and the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund.

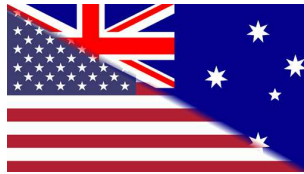

Australian-United States
Word of the Month



Let's examine some commonly used Australian words and the American English counterparts!

When Phoebe and James are complaining about something in an unpleasant tone, as Australians we'll ask them not to *whinge*, rather than instructing them not to *whine*. Both mean to complain peevishly or fretfully.

Both whinge and whine are date back to old English words from the 12th and 13th century, however. Whine comes from the word which means a whizzing or humming sound, such as is heard when an arrow is in flight. Whinge comes from the word which means to make a sound like a dog whimpering.

In the U.S., whine is only used. In the U.K., both whinge and whine are used (the first for a peevish complaint, the second for a variety of sounds made by people, animals or objects). In Australia, most of the time, the U.K. usage is followed.

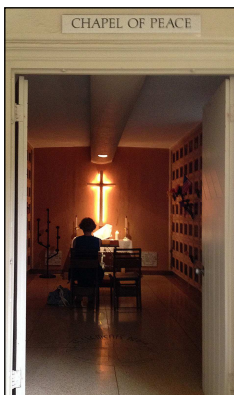

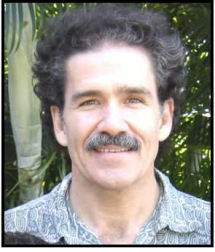

A View from the Pew



*“I give you a New Commandment,
that you love one another.
Just as I have loved you,
you also should love one another.”
~ Jesus / John 13:34 ~*

Year after year, I am struck by this reading. Superficially, I’m struck because I can never understand why we read it after Easter, during the Easter Season, when in my mind it ought to be read during Lent, as we approach Easter. Jesus gave this commandment to His disciples during the Last Supper, the night he was betrayed by one of his own disciples, the night before he was crucified by the Romans.

Even so, I never find it anti-climatic that it is read during the Easter Season, the 50 days leading into Pentecost. More thoughtfully, this commandment is the epitome of Christian morality and the essence of its ethos. In a spiritual “Catch 22,” without this commandment there would be no Christianity and there would be no Christians. On one hand, what makes us Christians is to believe Jesus is the Son of God, God fully revealed in him, and as a result our Messiah. On the other hand, if we invert his commandment, Jesus is saying to us that, if we fail to obey it, we are not his disciples, literally his “followers,” and as a result, inescapably we are not Christians.

*“Do not think that I have come to abolish

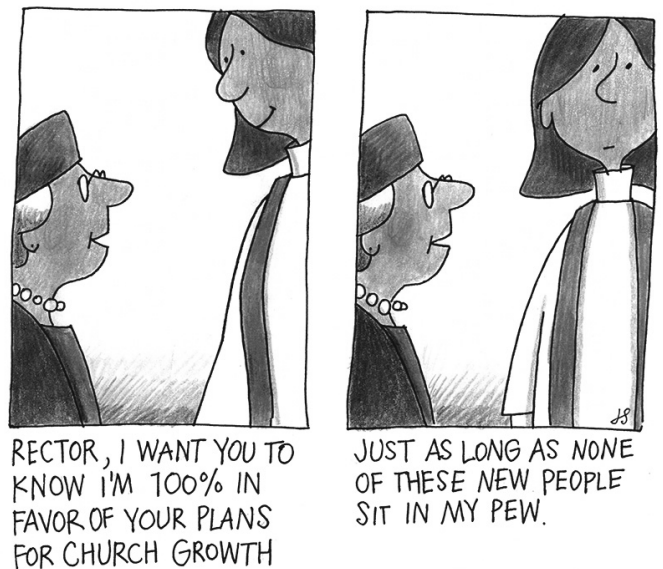
Yet, what appears to be a straight-forward albeit challenging commandment is actually more profound than most of us realize, let alone appreciate. It is actually a refinement of the two traditional commandments that summarize the original Ten Commandments and, as a result, The Law and the words of the Prophets. First, as Jesus shared in Matthew 5:37-39, “*You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.*” which summarizes the first four of the Ten Commandments concerning our relationship with God. And second, that “*You shall love your neighbor as yourself.*” which summarizes the last six of the Ten Commandments concerning our relationship with one another. Cryptically, however, Jesus also tells us in Matthew that, “*Yet the second is like the first.*” In another spiritual “Catch 22,” Jesus is saying to us that, it is only through loving God that can we truly love ourselves, and it is only through loving one another as ourselves that can we truly love God.

*“Upon these two commandments rests
The Law and the words of the Prophets.”
~ Jesus / Matthew 22:40 ~*

Maybe this is why we read Jesus’ Commandment during the Easter Season before Pentecost instead of during Lent. Pentecost is the day that Jews celebrate the giving of The Law by God to Moses, who in turn shared The Law with the Twelve Tribes of Israel, and out of which and through whom the religion of Judaism emerged. Similarly for Christians, Pentecost is the day we celebrate the giving of the Holy Spirit to the disciples, making them the Apostles, literally “messengers,” and out of which and through whom the religion of Christianity emerged. Pentecost is the day that we recognize that God’s Love is The Law and the words of the Prophets, that Jesus is the fulfillment of The Law and the words of the Prophets, that The Law and the words of the Prophets are God’s Love, and that, as a result, God is Love. All recognition and religion aside, in still another spiritual “Catch 22,” Pentecost is equally the day we remember that, to be a disciple of God ~ a “follower” ~ it means we must inseparably embrace God’s Love, be embraced by God’s Love, and embrace one another in God’s Love.

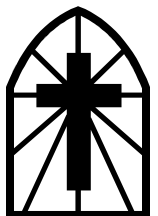
