





'Āina Aloha Exhibit at Bishop Museum



Sunday, November 11, 2018 from 1 pm Commemorative Day for Queen Liliuokalani

Aloha all,

Might I introduce you folks to a most unusual and remarkable mural, 'Āina Aloha (Beloved Hawai'i) - a touring, story-telling double-sided mural about the past and a hoped-for pathway to healing, from a Hawaiian viewpoint. It is on display at the Bishop Museum through January 2019 in the Long Gallery in Hawaiian Hall. It is part of the UNREAL exhibition.

The work was created by a team of six well-known Native Hawaiian



artists - Al Lagunero, Meleanna Meyer, Harinani Orme, Kahi Ching, Carl F.K. Pao, and Solomon Enos - whose objective was to create work that compelled the viewer to think about story and history - mo'olelo of Hawai'i and its past. There is a great need to seek truth and delve into the historical and cultural

trauma experienced by Native Hawaiians, past and present.

The 'Āina Aloha mural is an educational outreach to communities, offering them opportunities to discuss difficult issues in the safety of kupuna energies, and armed with the knowledge of learning about



Hawai'i's true past. This work is meant as an important healing opportunity, from which we together can work to assist all of our various communities to do the difficult work of understanding the past, forgiving, healing and moving on towards the wellness that we all seek. Come and take a tour with one of the artists, our own **Meleanna Meyer**, who as project lead, will be on hand to give you all a personal guided tour of this mural and two others at the Bishop Museum on which she was the lead artist.

We will be getting a discounted entrance admission fee. Which for our group will be \$12.00 a person, half the usual fee. Please meet at the front entrance of the Bishop Museum by 1 pm. If you plan to attend please let Deacon Ha'aheo (guanson@me.com) know.

A View from the Pew



'50 So, throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus.

51Then Jesus said to him, 'What do you want me to do for you?'

The blind man said to him, 'My Teacher, *- let me see again.'

⁵²Jesus said to him, 'Go, your faith has made you well.' Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way."

The Gospel According to Mark / 10:50-52

Like most if not all of the stories about Jesus, there is always more than one lesson, with the most obvious lesson usually not being the point of the story. Everything about the life of Jesus is not just allegorical, it is parabolic. First, there is the story itself, and then there are the metaphors, analogies, and symbols, and the meanings embedded within, obvious as well as subtle, and often times, for all practical purposes, concealed. To take the stories of Jesus, not to mention the Bible in it's entirely, at face value is to limit understanding, invite misunderstanding, and to miss the many points therein altogether.

A great example is last Sunday's Gospel reading from Mark about Jesus restoring the sight of a homeless man, a "beggar" named Bartimaeus. Before he was healed, many people in the crowd who had gathered in Jericho to see, hear, and experience Jesus scolded Bartimaeus because they very likely believed his prayer ~ his plea for mercy ~ was selfish, or that Jesus was too important to be bothered with someone of low standing such as him. It would not even be surprising if some of Jesus' own disciples told Bartimaeus to be quiet, too. However, when Jesus heard Bartimaeus, with his shouts nearly drowned out by the clamor of the crowd, Jesus told the people to bring Bartimaeus to him. When Bartimaeus was subsequently told Jesus would see him, he threw off his cloak, jumped up to his feet, and was led through the crowd to Jesus. Face to face, Jesus asked Bartimaeus what he wanted him to do. In reply, Bartimaeus answered, "My teacher, let me see again." To this, Jesus said, "Go, your faith has made you well." With these simple words, Bartimaeus' sight was restored and he followed Jesus on the way.

Of course, Bartimaeus' faith made him well, but this is only a backdrop for a much greater point in this story. After ten of the sixteen chapters in the Gospel According to Mark, even if we had been inattentive or skimming as we read, we should have at least an idea of what our faith can do, what the faith of others can do, and even tragically what people's a lack of faith can do. To mention just a few of the faith-stories in Mark: In Galilee, a faithful leper comes to Jesus begging for mercy and, with a only touch, is cured; a faithful father's young son is healed of seizures with a simple blessing; inversely, a wealthy man lacking faith rejects Eternal Life and chooses his earthly possessions instead; and then there are the faithful crowds throughout Jesus' ministry who bring him the deaf, the mute, the paralyzed, the sick, the possessed, and even the dead, and they are restored. Think about it: Why would we need yet another story such as this one, however remarkable, about the inherent power of faith in Jesus, whether it be our faith, the faith of another, or the faith of a community?

The temptation, and granted it is a huge one, is to argue that faith is what is required if we want God, through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit, to miraculously intercede on our own behalf, on behalf of someone close to us, on behalf of someone we sympathize with in our community, or even on behalf of someone in dire need who, for all practical purposes, lives in another world. However, as we all know, God does not always grant us our prayers, at least not in the way we intended, formed, and shared them, no matter how faithful or unfaithful we might be. After all, should we forget, God's answers to our prayers are gifts, not things that we or others are entitled to or deserve. We are not employed by God to do God's bidding and God is not our paymaster compensating us with answers to our prayers. In the same way, God is certainly not employed by us nor paid with our prayers to do our bidding. To believe otherwise is the ultimate in narcissism and self-entitlement, eliminating the very concept of "gift" entirely. On the other hand, God always listens to our prayers and, if we listen to God as well, even our most conceited, vain, self-serving, and profane prayers can be transformed into God's altogether self-sacrificing will. Similarly, I would argue that, much like our prayers, our entire beings are transformed by our faith, the faith of others, and the faith of entire communities.

In my mind, the point of this story is hidden within the drama of the segments of the last three sentences of this story. Bartimaeus throwing off his cloak, the only thing protecting him from the world. Bartimaeus ⁵springing up when called and coming to Jesus unshielded and completely vulnerable. Bartimaeus asking Jesus to^{*} let him see again. And finally, Bartimaeus ⁵² regaining his sight and following Jesus not on the way, but on The Way. In other words, the meaning of this story is not so much about Bartimaeus' sight being restored through faith, as miraculous as it was. Rather, it is about what happens to the "Bartimaeus" in all of us when we dare shout out in the presence of the Lord, asking, begging for a miracle. This story could be a warning: We will be transformed.
