A View from the Pew

Yet, what is even more ironic, even though Jesus was all of these things, He did not strive to overturn, rewrite, or dismiss a single word of The Law (Torah) or The Prophets (Nevi'im), the two main tomes in which all of the major books of the Jewish Bible are contained, the books that formed and informed Judaism, the belief and faith in God of the people of Israel, the religion that guided their belief and faith in God, and the most influential Holy Scriptures of Jesus' life. Nor did Jesus strive to harm or divide us. If the stories of Jesus are any indication, such as the Canaanite woman in Mark 7:24-30. a pagan people abhorred by Jews, the Roman Centurion in Matthew 8:5-13, the hated military occupiers of Israel, and the Samaritan merchant in Luke 10:30-37, for all practical purposes despised pseudo-Jewish heretics, then Jesus advocated and did quite the opposite. Through His living example, The Good News, The Way, The Path, which was founded entirely on The Law and The Prophets, not to mention the third and final tome, The Writings (Ketuvim), Jesus gave us a God-centered, neighbor-centered, life-giving, life-advocating, and love-directed ascent of individual and mutual salvation, in this life and in the Life to Come.

What is still more ironic, the largest, most influential, most powerful detractors of The Good News, The Way, The Christians ourselves. we the fundamentalists, moderates, progressives, and radicals. We placate ourselves with such self-deceiving maxims as, "We live in this world, not the next" or "You have to look out for No. 1" or "If we don't, they will." Nevertheless, what is most ironic of all, as accurate as these maxims actually are, is that the only viable way and path through this Human Experience. as incredible as God created It, but as treacherous and tragic as we made it, and which we in our collective duplicity fault our neighbors and even God for, is in reality The Path, The Way, The Gospel of our Lord. Anything less, as our military strategists cringe to euphemize, is MAD, Mutually Assured Destruction, not only in this life, but in the *Life to Come*.

We can no longer take Jesus for granted, much less what He embodied, lived, and died for. We are not in some faux, academic, spiritual exercise. Our existential privilege does not except us from nor assure us of anything. On the contrary, it makes us more vulnerable. We must "walk the talk" not vice versa. We must, as our Lord and Savior commanded on that Passover night long ago, when He was betrayed by one of His own Apostles, one of His own friends, when He was denied by yet another Apostle, another friend, on that Passover night before He sacrificed Himself in Body and Blood on the Cross, not just to atone for our sins, as if that would somehow make our wrongs right, but likewise to make and pave The Way, The Path of Salvation and, as a result, Eternal Life, saving.

The Bible, whether the original Jewish scriptures, the later Christian ones, or the apocryphal found in between, is made up of fact and fiction, history and harbinger, poetry song, promises and commandments, rules and regulations, parables and truths. Our temptation, however, is to interpret them literally, whether we understand the languages they were originally written in, grasp why they were translated the way they were, have knowledge of their historical, cultural, social, religious, political and economic context, or whether religiously we are zealous reactionaries, conservative fundamentalists, liberal moderates, progressive reformers, or radical revolutionaries. What we have in common is that we are literalists and, as a result, that we misunderstand.

Zealots use literal *misunderstanding* of Holy Scripture suppress, crush and abolish. Fundamentalists use literal misunderstanding of Holy Scripture to discriminate, marginalize and separate. Moderates use literal misunderstanding of Holy Scripture to dismiss what offends them and to keep what is appealing, like a menu in a restaurant. Reformers use literal misunderstanding of Holy Scripture to rewrite what they disagree with and exaggerate what they do not. Radicals use their literal misunderstanding of Holy Scripture to overturn it and promote their own myopic and inevitably self-serving religious or anti-religious agendas. Ironically, albeit in an inverted positive way, the Messiah, the Savior, the Christ Jesus, our Lord God infinitely revealed to and shared with us in our finite humanity, was all of these things, Zealot, Fundamentalist, Liberal, Progressive, and Radical.
