Church in a Box

Last month I wrote about God in a Box. This month I'd like to explore "Church in a Box."

This past week I was at the parish retreat at Camp Mokule'ia. As we were setting up for the service in a building they have rented in a historic area, a number of people cheerfully referred to their "church in a box." Church did seem to come out of

the box. The box contained the chalice, candles, altar linens and other items.

I have seen this "church in a box" phenomenon before. Many of the congregations in my former Diocese of San Joaquin met in buildings that were not their own due multiple court battles over ownership of the buildings. They met in Lutheran churches, USO centers, and Jewish synagogues. One congregation even met in a re-created western town near Yosemite. The church I substituted for in France did a similar thing. They met in a Roman Catholic Church which meant that the members had to pack up movable chairs and collapsible altars every Sunday after church. Church seemed to come out of a box and then go back into a box for the rest of the week.

There are other boxes for church. We often call them chapels, sanctuaries or just plain churches but in reality that is what they are: boxes for church, only larger in size. In New York City there is a huge office building at 475 Riverside Drive where the National Council of Churches has its headquarters. That office building is also home to a number of denominational national church offices. The multi -story office building is nicknamed, "The God box." At the end of the service at camp last Sunday with Fr. Christopher the chairs went back to their original places, tables put away, and the boxes of church treasures stored to come back home, the travelling church was packed up. Yet the church itself escaped being packed away. Here at St. Clement's that same Sunday after the 10:15 service, I watched as the ushers straightened up the pews and closed the windows and doors. Yet the church was not closed.

As people left that morning I reflected that the church was not packed up or closed up at all, the church was leaving the building and entering into ministry beyond the box.

I believe that is what God calls us to each and every Sunday – ministry beyond the box that we call church.



Rector Search Committee: Update



This is to provide you with a brief update on the activities of the Search Committee to date.

The Search Committee has been meeting together on a regular basis. The members of the committee strongly believe in the importance of obtaining input regarding the rector search from all members of POSC in order to ensure that

everyone's voice can be heard and so that the Parish Profile which will be provided to potential candidates accurately reflects our parish.

To start this process, a survey has been created that can be completed either online or via pen and paper. This past Sunday, September 11, committee members spoke at both the 7:30 and 10:15 services to discuss the role of the Search Committee and to advise everyone of the forthcoming survey and the proposed timeframe. This coming Sunday (September 18) members of the Search Committee will again speak at the two services to explain and answer any questions. Sunday is also the proposed launch date for the survey and we hope to have the surveys returned to the committee by October 31, 2016. Paper copies will be available at the services as well.

On Sunday, [October 23rd] (in coordination with Adult Formation groups) we plan to hold a forum between the two services in the Parish House. We want to solicit input and to provide the opportunity for members to share their thoughts, concerns and comments with the committee regarding the selection of our new Rector.

Also: We are looking forward to receiving another member to replace Cathy Overstreet who is unable to continue due to other obligations.

The committee is meeting this week and will select a liaison to the Vestry in order to facilitate regular reports from the Search Committee to the Vestry.

We are honored to be entrusted with the responsibility you have given to us and we continue our work prayerfully and with practical and spiritual guidance from Canon Kate, Rev. Chris and Bishop Bob.

rancis Bernardone, born into a wealthy Assisi merchant family, famously unburdened himself of his privilege in order to take up another yoke. Among the many wonderful, if apocryphal, stories from his life of pilgrimage and poverty are numerous encounters with animals. He is said to have preached to birds, wolves and people alike, and acted as if all were yoked together for good in God's new creation.

Some 800 years later, in the California city that bears the name of Francis, we still struggle to recognize our common yoke. Exciting but profoundly disruptive economic changes make it increasingly difficult for middle-income households to find a home in the beautiful City by the Bay. Tent cities perch uneasily alongside the polished habitations of tech entrepreneurs.

Although the contrast here may seem especially stark, our city is hardly the only place where unlikely neighbors dwell in unsettling proximity. I am reminded of the story of Francis admonishing the wolf that had been terrorizing the town of Gubbio. When Francis realized that the wolf was merely hungry, he asked the skeptical townsfolk to welcome and feed the wolf, with the eventual result that adversaries became friends.

reflection questions

- Are there inner or outer fears that make it hard for you to see God's new creation?
- · What good news do you need to hear - or experience - in order to befriend your fears and share a yoke with those unlike you?
- How might you and your community feed the "good wolf" within yourselves in order to live with greater courage and generosity?

I wonder in what ways we may be called to befriend even that which frightens us the most. It might be the neighbor who seems threatening to us, but it could just as easily be the doubts that our efforts can make a difference.

Even when I fail to see the new creation God is making possible, my church continues to be a community of generous yokefellows who witness to our need for each other, poor and rich alike. Our collective stewardship of time, talent and treasure has fostered robust local institutions like Episcopal Charities, which addresses root causes of poverty in our midst, and Episcopal Community Services, the largest provider of shelter beds in San Francisco. These outreach partners preach good news - sometime even using words, as Francis reminded us to do - but always with shelter, employment development, health advocacy, friendship and food.

Which reminds me of another apocryphal story about wolves that sometimes makes the rounds among preachers. A wise elder counsels a young man that all humans have within us two wolves. One wolf is good and the other evil, he says, and they are constantly fighting each other. The young man asks the elder, "But which wolf will win?" And the elder replies, "The one that you feed."

Camp Mokule'ia has had a lasting impact on generations of children in Hawaii. But not all families can afford to send their kids to camp. Executive Director David Turner often obtains grants to cover the costs of bringing local underserved kids to camp. This year, however, the heavy wave damage consumed his grant writing attention. So we are having a fundraiser luau at Camp Mokule'ia on Saturday, November 26, 2016 to raise money for "Camperships" to provide children in need with the Camp experience. We hope you will attend the luau or become a participating sponsor of at least \$100 to be featured in our event program.

Our goal is to raise \$60,000 to provide the Camp experience for 2 days and 1 night at **no cost** to **600 youth** next year; or with partial scholarships we can provide **up to 1200** youth with the Camp experience!
