GOD IN A BOX

"...a wandering Aramean was my ancestor." (Deuteronomy 26:5).

I love the story of Abraham. God calls Abraham to leave his home and all that is familiar to strike out on a journey into the unknown. Abraham is an Aramean and as a nomad he wanders until he

is led by faith to the land of promise. Did Abraham have a map that told him how to get where he was going? No. But Abraham did have faith. He had faith in the God who called him into relationship and would lead him into the unknown. The God of Abraham is bigger than the safety and security of the already known and familiar of his homeland.

Eventually the children of Abraham, the Israelites, find themselves wandering in the desert. They need more structure and more direction so God provides them with the ten commandments. These commandments are reflective of the covenant that God has established with the people and the stone tablets are put in a "box" called the Ark of the Tabernacle. The Israelites carried the Ark with them wherever they went as a tangible reminder that God was with them.

In due course the Israelites occupied the promised land, became more settled, and in some ways wanted God to become more settled as well. They insisted on a King rather than rely on God as King. Then King Solomon built a temple. The temple was an even bigger box to store the Ark of the Tabernacle which was a smaller box in which to keep the covenant and perhaps, the covenantal relationship. It was just too tempting for the Israelites to relegate God to the box and rely instead on their earthly king.

In time the Israelites were conquered and carried off into exile – another time of wandering and regaining the trust and faith that God would wander with them. They lost both the Ark and the Temple. Things did not go as they had planned, but God remained with them. God left the box of their expectations and journeyed with them once again into the unknown.

I find myself wondering if there are ways in which we try to keep God in a box. At times I am sure that all of us want to control God, or at least bargain with God. We want God on our terms. We want God to fix our problems, fix our kids, and fix our finances. We want God to do bigger things too; fix our church, fix our country, fix our environment. We would prefer that God do as we direct; that God meet our expectations and parameters and climb into the box of our design. But God does not do as we instruct. God chooses to be bigger than we can imagine and have ideas and that we could never have envisioned.

Christians are often referred to as a pilgrim people. We are people on a holy journey with God, wherever that journey may lead. The journey may very well lead into intimidating or alien places but God promises to leave the box we have created for God and go with us into our unknowns.

I'd like to share with you a prayer by Thomas Merton. This prayer has given me hope and encouraged the faith that is in me when I have felt particularly lost and in need of God to accompany me in my journey outside the box.

My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end.

Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so.

But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you and I hope that I have that desire in all that I am doing.

And I know that if I do this, you will lead me by the right road although I may know nothing about it.

Therefore will I trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death, I will not fear, for you are ever with me and you will never leave me to face my perils alone.

The meal is prepared in our parish kitchen on a Thursday and then heated and transported on the second Sunday of even numbered months to the shelter. The meal is served at the Family shelter (women and children) and also at the Men's shelter where residents and anyone coming in from the street is welcomed.

Volunteers from St. Clement's help to serve the meal at the Men's shelter from 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. Five or more people are needed to help serve each time we provide the meal. If you are interested in this ministry, please contact Canon Kate to become involved. We are looking to increase the volunteer pool so folks don't have to serve every time.

Reflections on "Soul Shop: Ministering to Suicidal Desperation"

"Sometimes, somebody going through what you are going through may contemplate suicide."



At the "Soul Shop: Ministering to Suicidal Desperation" workshop on August 19, we were encouraged to pose that direct question to those potentially in a state of suicidal desperation.

I joined a range of Buddhist, Christian, and Jewish participants at the one-day workshop, hosted by the Higashi Hongwanji Mission.

Co-sponsored by the Samaritan Counseling Center Hawai'i, the workshop is part of a larger initiative of the Pittsburgh Pastoral Institute.

The data on suicide in the United States is sobering: CDC data from 2013 reminds us that suicide is the 10th leading cause of death and that annually, there are about 500,000 suicide attempts across the nation.

"Soul Shop" focuses on a pastoral response, grounded in and from a faith community. Participants are invited to be leaders within their congregations, inspiring the local religious 'ohana to become a "Soul Safe Community."

This type of community is one which responds to suicidal desperation through God's call, framed in this way:

Commit to tell someone about your own times of suicidal desperation

Commit to talk to someone who you have reason to believe maybe suffering from suicidal desperation

Ask them if they are considering suicide

Listen to their story

Lead them to safety and leave them in good hands

As part of the day, the participants were invited to write prayers for those in the midst of suicidal desperation, for their families, and for those who work and minister with them. We were touched by the Divine's presence in and through prayers written from various faith traditions.

God Spirit of wisdom was certainly ministering right there – in and through the workshop! It was a blessed day. Please speak to me to learn more about "Soul Shop" and about enriching St. Clement's as a "Soul Safe Community."

A prayer by Christopher+, written in the context of the Soul Shop Workshop


Loving Creator, God of hope, of dreams, of vision: restore to those who are contemplating suicide; hope for the future, dreams of the past, and a clear vision of the present.

Grant them companions on the way, and bring them to fullness of life on this good earth which you have made; through Jesus Christ, in the power of the Spirit. Amen



A Correction on "Inclusion"

Last month I wrote about the inclusive nature of the Episcopal Church, referencing the fact that we welcome the LGBTQ community: welcoming them in all aspects of their life.

The Diocese of Hawai'i, and the Parish of St. Clement, do warmly welcome everyone – everyone! We welcome and encourage all to express their humanity through the gift of human sexuality and through the blessing of covenantal and legal marriage.

However, here I need to make a correction, and state that, at this point, not all Diocese' of the Episcopal Church are fully inclusive. In my article last month, I painted with a broad brush stroke, and did not articulate that a small number of Diocese' still maintain an official stance against the full inclusion of the LGBTQ community.

In July last year, twenty bishops of the Episcopal Church issued "The Salt Lake City Statement," a statement in which the Bishops dissented from the actions of the General Convention in passing resolutions A036 and A054 (those resolutions revised church canon law to approve marriage equality following the June 26, 2015 U.S. Supreme Court ruling legalizing same-sex marriage for all in the U.S.)¹

To this day, many of the same Bishops routinely fail to embrace clergy who are legally married in same-sex relationships. These bishops reject gay clergy, stop them from being licenced, and bar them from expressing their God-given vocation as a deacon, priest, or bishop.

Sadly, this continued refusal to embrace the revelation of God's love and grace through God's people – people made in the image of God's love – means the continued rejection, abuse, neglect, and persecution of the LGBTQ community. Both lay and ordained suffer in a church which refuses to take seriously Jesus' call of radical inclusion, and the apostles' call to walk in love as Christ loved us.

Let us continue to pray for of God's children who suffer from individual, corporate, or institutional maltreatment. Let us pray, that one day, all may be embraced in love, in sexuality, in marriage, across the entire branch of the Jesus movement: that movement which is The Episcopal Church.²

years. Like the ancient Israelites who used the above utterances from an intoxicated Noah in the Hebrew Bible to justify suppressing and oppressing the indigenous Canaanites, like more modern Christians and Muslims from the 15th through the 19th centuries who used the same text to rationalize kidnapping, selling, and enslaving Africans, and like contemporary 20th century Caucasian Christians who used it to defend apartheid and segregation in the United States, Europe, and southern Africa, the Human Family today in the 21st century continues to practice and promote racism in all its forms, both overtly and in subtle ways. Despite the fact that Judaism, Christianity, and Islam have all categorically rejected racism and every aberration of their Holy Scriptures which supported it, Jews, Christians, and Muslims alike continue to vilify and persecute people solely upon the basis of their race, as if somehow a person's race ~ or even just the color of their skin ~ makes them deserving of our communal scorn and hatred, and the suffering and despair we inflict. Yet, here is the paradox: Biologically and metaphysically there is no such thing as "race."

Race is a notion, concept, term, and reality entirely concocted by us. In other words, we made it up. To borrow a maxim from our Hindu and Buddhist brothers and sisters, race was and always will be an illusion. It is something completely manufactured by one group of people to explain our irrational feelings of superiority over another group of people, to legitimize the horrors we afflicted and afflict them with, and to absolve ourselves of the evils that, in our hearts, minds, and souls, we knew and know that we had committed and continue to commit. It was and still is not simply an intellectual shortcoming or folly of the human condition. The very idea of race, and the racism that necessarily ensues, is not just ignorance or idiocy, it is madness.

But, here is the irony: Those of us who are working hard to eliminate racism, not to mention the discrimination which unavoidably arises out of it, are perpetuating racism every time we use the word race, as if it was and continues to be a matter of fact. It is not fact. It is fiction. Homo Sapiens, the Human Family to which we all belong, are so genetically alike that we do not even have subspecies like Big Cats and K9's do in nature. The only other Human races, or more

correctly Human species, such as the ancient Homo Erectus of Asia or the more recent Homo Neanderthal of Europe, passed from existence in prehistory. What is fact, however, is that the mitochondrial DNA of all humans living today can be traced back to a single Homo Sapiens woman, an "Eve" who lived over 100,000 years ago in eastern Africa. She is our common mitochondrial ancestor, and has been and still is our common ancestor through an unbroken genetic chain passed on by all of our mothers ever since she gave birth to her first daughter. To be sure, as Homo Sapiens migrated out of Africa into the rest or the world, we developed a variety of differing traits as our bodies adapted to a variety of differing environments, but the fact remains we are only one Human Family.

To borrow a catch-phrase from the environmental activist and former Vice President Al Gore, here is another "inconvenient truth" for those of us who cling to the misconception of race: There is no such thing as white or black human skin color, as if we need to be reminded by our elementary school art teachers that white and black are not colors. All skin human color is brown to one degree or another, with the only exception being people afflicted with the most severe forms of Albinism, a genetic disorder that affects melanin production across the Human Family. Melanin is the substance in the body produced by the sun which gives color to our hair, skin, and iris of our eyes. Our skin is a lighter or darker color of brown, depending upon how long our ancestors were historically exposed to the sun. If our ancestry goes back 2,000 to 3,000 years or more in Northern Europe, our skin color will be fair. If our ancestry goes back a similar time span in Australia, our skin color will be dark. Inversely, skin color can revert, as it did in the people of southern India whose ancestors originally migrated north from Africa and became fair, and then migrated south and became dark again. The majority of the Human Family is somewhere in between. In other words, to attach pejorative connotations onto each other based on how light or dark is our skin is not just ignorance or idiocy, it too is madness.
