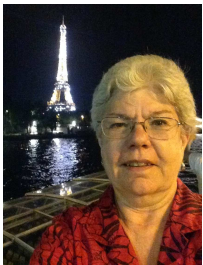

From Canon Kate

The Episcopal Church – more than the USA!



I am writing to you from France where I am covering for four Sunday services at the American Cathedral in Paris. The Dean of the cathedral is away on vacation and so I am filling in for her during my own vacation in exchange for the use of her apartment.

While most of us know that the Episcopal Church is part of the world-wide Anglican Communion which exists virtually all over the world, not all of us know that the Episcopal Church exists beyond the borders of the United States of America. The Episcopal Church/Anglican Communion and the Roman Catholic Church are among the few Christian Churches that basically exist around the world. Baptists and Methodists are principally an American phenomenon; Presbyterians exist in Scotland and the US; and Lutherans are found primarily in the USA, Germany, Scandinavia and a number of countries in Africa that are former German colonies. Very few Christian denominations exist around the globe in the way that the Anglican Communion and the Roman Catholic Church do.

The Episcopal Church existed in a number of countries that we as an American church have missionized and evangelized as a church. The Episcopal Church planted churches in Mexico, South and Central American countries, the Philippines and more. More recently provinces such as Mexico, Central America, Brazil and the Philippines have become independent from the Episcopal Church through an autonomy process and now exist as independent provinces of the Anglican Communion. But the Episcopal Church continues to exist in Taiwan, Puerto Rico, Haiti, the Dominican Republic, Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador and Honduras. The Episcopal Church also exists in a number of countries in Europe.

The American Cathedral in Paris is part of the Convocation of American Churches in Europe, which is a diocese unto itself and part of the Episcopal Church. The bishop here in Europe is, technically, a Suffragan Bishop who reports to the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. There are 18 American Churches of the Episcopal Church located in Europe in France, Germany, Italy,

Belgium and Switzerland. These churches were established to serve the American community working in Europe. Obviously, these churches do not just attract Americans. They attract English speakers living in Europe so these congregations are quite international. This congregation in Paris has Americans, Australians, New Zealanders, people from Britain, Tanzania, Nigeria, Benin, Liberia, China, the Philippines as well as Parisians who want to work on their English.

These American Churches in Europe exist alongside some Church of England Churches in Europe who also minister to English speakers in Europe. This is one of the few places in the world where there are overlapping jurisdictions of Bishops and Dioceses within the Anglican Communion. It is quite unique and has produced some tensions. Almost five or six years ago it appeared that the Church of England, the American Church in Europe, the Reformed Episcopal Church of Spain and the Lusitanian Church of Portugal might get together and form one big diocese of Europe, but that has not proved to be the case. Ecumenism can be hard, even within churches that are in communion with one another, just as living out Jesus mandate “that we all be one” has been hard for Christians to live into.

I am enjoying my time here in Paris and will return soon to St. Clement's. While I have been away you have completed your call to a new rector who will start Sunday services on October 1, 2017. My last day with you at St. Clement's will be September 30, 2017. I have enjoyed being with you during your transition and look forward to continuing some friendship with all of you.

Blessings on you and your new rector as you enter your ministry together.

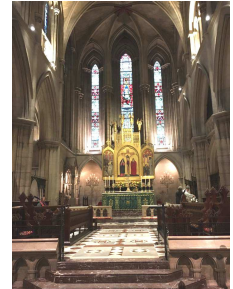

Blessing of the Animals

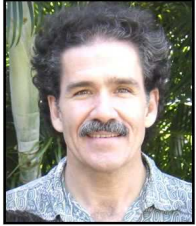

A View from the Pew

*“You said in your heart, ‘I will ascend to heaven;
I will raise my throne above the stars of God;
I will sit on the mount of assembly on the heights of Zaphon; *
I will ascend to the tops of the clouds; I will make myself like the
Most High.’ ”*

~~ Isaiah 14:13-14 / Lucifer, The Fall



It sounds like a gross understatement, but a genuine relationship with God is like a genuine relationship with anyone else. Likewise, it sounds like an extraordinary overstatement, but a genuine relationship with someone else is like a genuine relationship with God. Adding to this dual

concord, what most of us fail to recognize and realize, let alone understand and appreciate, is that a genuine relationship with God requires a genuine relationship with God’s Children, all of them, not just the ones we love or like, or with whom we agree. In other words, when we are in a genuine relationship with all of God’s Children, we are in a genuine relationship with God. Anything less is uncertain. When we are in relationship with God and one another, i.e. with one another and with God, we are no longer distant or separated from God and one another, we are not detached and isolated; we are not in a state of Sin. Instead, we are close to if not adjoined with God and one another, we are connected and united; we are in a state of Grace.

A genuine relationship, whether it be with God, a spouse, our children, our extended families, our friends and neighbors, or even our enemies, is like a relationship between two legendary Phoenixes. An ancient symbol of self-sacrifice, reincarnation, and resurrection, in its undeterrable flight to reach the Sun, the Phoenix would inevitably combust, but out of its ashes new life would arise again, ad infinitum. In other words, as long as our flight paths are directed towards the Sun, no matter what happens along the way, we will receive eternal life. Similarly, as a relationship between *two* Phoenixes evolves, and as they become closer to one another flying higher towards the Sun, together they simultaneously combust and are completely destroyed in flight. However, instead of dying, out of their commingled ashes arises an entirely new and singular identity: a couple, a family, a community, even an alliance between former foes. In other words, if we are to be in a genuine relationship with God and one another, i.e. with one another and with God, like Jesus before us in whom God was revealed, we must mutually sacrifice ourselves for the other and, in the process, destroy the idols we have created out of our own human experiences. As daunting as it sounds, we must sacrifice the idols, the “graven images” that we have created out of ourselves in order to unite with one another and with God as the Spiritual Beings that God created us and intends us to be.

Easier said than done. Even so, this dilemma does not absolve us from trying, individually and with the help of God and others. In my mind, like the legendary Phoenixes, every time we fly into the Sun, every time we burst into flames and reduce ourselves into ashes with God and for God, with others and for others, out of this sacrifice we become closer to God and closer to one another until, ultimately, we become one in relationship with God and one another in the Kingdom of God.

Instead of “arriving at” the Kingdom of God, life is about “flying” there. If we are not flying, then we are not living. As long as we raise our individual selves above God and others, as long as our lives are focused on “*I will*” do this, and “*I will*” do that, and “*I will*” be whatever “*I think*” it is “*I ought*” to be in lieu of others, in other words, as long as “*It is all about Me,*” we are not much different than Lucifer, “*the Shining star,*” the most magnificent of God’s Angels. Nonetheless, Lucifer fell out of relationship with God and God’s host of Angels by falling into the self-made, self-deceiving, and self-destructive trap of *idolizing and loving himself* over and above worshipping God and loving his fellow Angels. On the other hand, every time we put others and their genuine needs before us, and every time others put us and our genuine needs before themselves, instead of acrimony, we begin to experience harmony. As opposed to hostility, we begin to demonstrate good will. Rather than hoarding, we are inspired to share. In place of persecution because of fear, we learn tolerance out of trust. From the ashes of enmity, arises love.
