

# Proper

Variable parts of the eucharistic liturgy and the Daily Office which are appointed for a particular day according the the season or occasion. These parts of the liturgy may be contrasted with the fixed portions and options of the liturgy which do not vary with the season or occasion. The proper for the Eucharist includes the collect, the lessons, the selection from the Psalter, and the proper preface. The Book of Common Prayer collects for the church year are presented in both traditional and contemporary language versions (pp. 159-261). The Lectionary readings and psalms for the Eucharist (Book of Common Prayer, pp. 889-931). The Daily Office Lectionary provides readings and psalms for Morning and Evening Prayer (Book of Common Prayer, pp. 936-1001). Propers for the Sundays in the Season after Pentecost are numbered one through twenty-nine.

The Book of Common Prayer includes propers for holy days, such as "Saint Andrew" and "The Annunciation"; the Common of Saints, such as "Of a Martyr" and "Of a Monastic"; and Various Occasions, such as "Of the Holy Trinity" and "Of the Incarnation." The Proper Prefaces of the Book of Common Prayer include three prefaces of the Lord's Day, prefaces for seasons, and prefaces for other occasions, such as baptism and marriage (pp. 377-382). The Book of Common Prayer also has a section of proper liturgies for special days, such as Ash Wednesday and the Easter Vigil (pp. 264-295). The service for Morning Prayer includes proper opening sentences (pp. 37-41, 75-78) and antiphons (pp. 43-44, 80-82).

# The Readings

A reading from the First Book of Samuel.

1 Samuel 8:4-11, (12-15),

16-20, (11:14-15)

This reading is typically from Hebrew Scriptures, which Jesus knew and from which he often referred or quoted.

Lector

Then all the elders of Israel gathered together and came to Samuel at Ramah, and said to him, "You are old and your sons do not follow in your ways; appoint for us, then, a king to govern us, like other nations." But the thing displeased Samuel when they said, "Give us a king to govern us." Samuel prayed to the Lord, and the Lord said to Samuel, "Listen to the voice of the people in all that they say to you; for they have not rejected you, but they have rejected me from being king over them. Just as they have done to me, from the day I brought them up out of Egypt to this day, forsaking me and serving other gods, so also they are doing to you. Now then, listen to their voice; only—you shall solemnly warn them, and show them the ways of the king who shall reign over them." So Samuel reported all the words of the Lord to the people who were asking him for a king.

He said, "These will be the ways of the king who will reign over you: he will take your sons and appoint them to his chariots and to be his horsemen, and to run before his chariots; and he will appoint for himself commanders of thousands and commanders of fifties, and some to plow his ground and to reap his harvest, and to make his implements of war and the equipment of his chariots. <sup>13</sup>He will take your daughters to be perfumers and cooks and bakers. He will take the best of your fields and vineyards and olive orchards and give them to his courtiers. He will take one-tenth of your grain and of your vineyards and give it to his officers and his courtiers. He will take your male and female slaves, and the best of your cattle and donkeys, and put them to his work. He will take one-tenth of your flocks, and you shall be his slaves. And in that day you will cry out because of your king, whom you have chosen for yourselves; but the Lord will not answer you in that day." But the people refused to listen to the voice of Samuel; they said, "No! but we are determined to have a king over us, so that we also may be like other nations, and that our king may govern us and go out before us and fight our battles."

Samuel said to the people, "Come, let us go to Gilgal and there renew the kingship." So all the people went to Gilgal, and there they made Saul king before the Lord in Gilgal. There they sacrificed offerings of well-being before the Lord, and there Saul and all the Israelites rejoiced greatly.

**Psalm** Psalm 138

The Psalms are prayers that Jesus used and cover every mood of humanity's relationship with God and one another.

The Psalm is prayed responsibly by the whole verse.

I will give thanks to you, O Lord, with my whole heart; \* before the gods I will sing your praise.

I will bow down toward your holy temple and praise your Name, \* because of your love and faithfulness; For you have glorified your Name \* and your word above all things.

When I called, you answered me; \* you increased my strength within me.

All the kings of the earth will praise you, O Lord, \* when they have heard the words of your mouth.

They will sing of the ways of the Lord, \* that great is the glory of the Lord.

Though the Lord be high, he cares for the lowly; \* he perceives the haughty from afar.

Though I walk in the midst of trouble, you keep me safe; \* you stretch forth your hand against the fury of my enemies; your right hand shall save me.

The Lord will make good his purpose for me; \*
O Lord, your love endures for ever;
do not abandon the works of your hands.

#### A reading from Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians.

2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1

This reading, taken from the Christian Scriptures, is typically from a letter (epistle) to the early Church, the Acts of the Apostles, or the Revelation of John.

Lector

But just as we have the same spirit of faith that is in accordance with scripture—"I believed, and so I spoke" —we also believe, and so we speak, because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence. Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God. So we do not lose heart.

Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal.

For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.



# Sequence Hymn

Hallujah! We sing your praises! Wonder, Love, and Praise, # 784

The sequence hymn moves us toward the summit of the Liturgy of the Word—the reading of the Holy Gospel.

Gospel means "good news"—specifically the "good news of Jesus."





#### Ka 'Euanelio Hemolele (The Holy Gospel)

Mark 3:20-35

This reading is taken from one of the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John), which depict the life, teachings, death, resurrection, and ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ. We stand for the Gospel reading to show the particular importance placed on Jesus' words and actions.

The three crosses that are upon the head, mouth, and heart can symbolize from my mind, out of my lips, into my heart! The Deacon also recognizes the blessings of God's Word in the Gospel by crossing the Gospel Book.

# Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. All Glory to you, Lord Christ.

And the crowd came together again, so that they could not even eat. When his family heard it, they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, "He has gone out of his mind." And the scribes who came down from Jerusalem said, "He has Beelzebul, and by the ruler of the demons he casts out demons." And he called them to him, and spoke to them in parables, "How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but his end has come. But no one can enter a strong man's house and plunder his property without first tying up the strong man; then indeed the house can be plundered.

"Truly I tell you, people will be forgiven for their sins and whatever blasphemies they utter; but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit can never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an eternal sin"— for they had said, "He has an unclean spirit."

Then his mother and his brothers came; and standing outside, they sent to him and called him. A crowd was sitting around him; and they said to him, "Your mother and your brothers and sisters are outside, asking for you." And he replied, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" And looking at those who sat around him, he said, "Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."







# **Sunday Morning Formation Groups**

All are welcome to join either of our discussion groups that meet on Sundays!

On Sunday mornings at 8:30 A.M., we offer our churchgoers two educational discussion groups: Adult Discussion and Reading Between the Lines.

**Adult Discussion** is open to anyone who wants to explore and expand their understanding of religion and spirituality by reading or watching selected non-Biblical sources and then discussing these in depth. We have been blessed to have participants with a wide variety of backgrounds in literature, education, science, theology, and the arts who recommend books for the group and keep our conversations lively. Adult Discussion sessions are available via Zoom and in person in the Parish House.

Reading Between the Lines (formerly known as the Bible Workbench) is a weekly conversation built around scripture and a collection of short texts (a few pages of reading for each meeting). RBTL allows participants to engage with one of the lectionary readings of the week, presents a central theme of that reading, and connects the biblical text to other writings on that theme. Participants take turns introducing the material and inviting responses, such as how the theme relates to events in the world and in participants' own lives. RBTL sessions are held in the Parish Hall.

Reading materials for these groups can be purchased from the church office for \$10. There is no membership fee.

# It Only Takes A Spark: A Pentecost Reflection

Some time ago, I incorporated a fashion show into a sermon titled who are you wearing. The congregation had great fun participating in this impromptu opportunity to show off "who" they were wearing or to walk down the red carpet in "what to wear" and "what not to wear", depending on whether they were wearing words that were edifying and encouraging or that were hurtful demeaning affixed to their garments. Each displayed a particular gift uniquely their own. Some hammed it up. Some took on the posture of the word pinned to their garments. Some let their faces tell the story. It was the gift of themselves. And of course, the winning garment was "Designed by Jesus." It only took a spark for the congregation to be drawn into the created scenario of the first ever "Spirit of the Lord awards".

Pentecost reminds us that we are rooted in abundance. We all have been given gifts through the work and presence of the Holy Spirit for the building up or the edification of God's beloved community, for transforming lives and caring for all of creation. A significant gift is the gift of ourselves warmed by the fire of the Spirit – it is the thing we bring to the table that no one else has and creates an abundance of gifts and resources manifested in that of which we are most passionate. Like the Kurt Kaiser song, "It only takes a spark to get a fire going." It is a spark of generosity of spirit and a willingness to share the love.

I first heard this song when I was in college. It was sung as a gift to the newly initiated into a sisterhood grounded in service, love and faith. I would hear it years later, and like the first time, again it was sung as a gift of love and encouragement to those seeking a deeper relationship with Christ. It only took a spark to spread the love. When sparks fly things are set ablaze and something wonderful emerges.

Like the giving of the Holy Spirit on the first Pentecost, when tongues like fire rested on the heads of those gathered, and they were given gifts to proclaim the good news in a way that everyone could understand, gifts are intended to be shared with others no strings attached. Freely we have received and freely we give. It only takes a spark. | Woorg


